

2. Changes in the number of persons with disabilities by age group (children and persons with physical disabilities, at home)





4. Changes in the number of persons with disabilities by age group (children and persons with intellectual disabilities, at home)












6. Changes in the number of persons with disabilities by type of disability (children and persons with physical disabilities, at home)

16. With or without spouse








