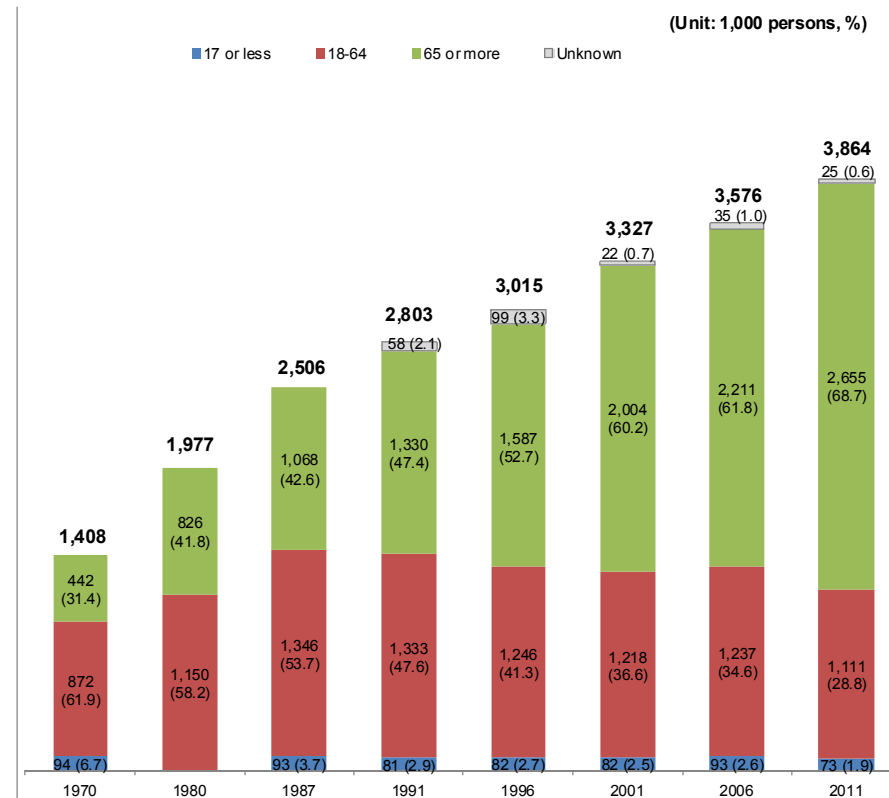

## 2. Changes in the number of persons with disabilities by age group (children and persons with physical disabilities, at home)



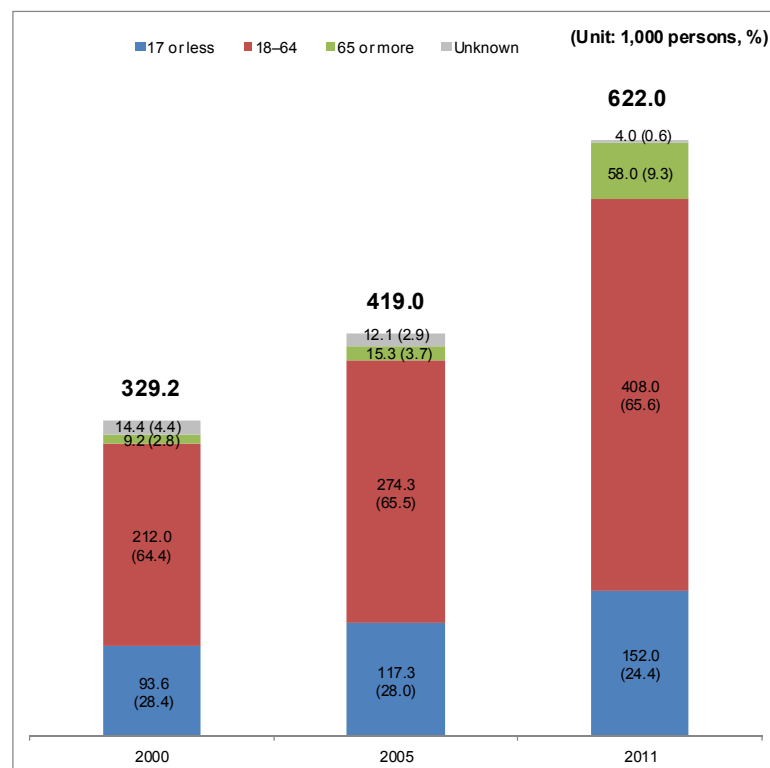

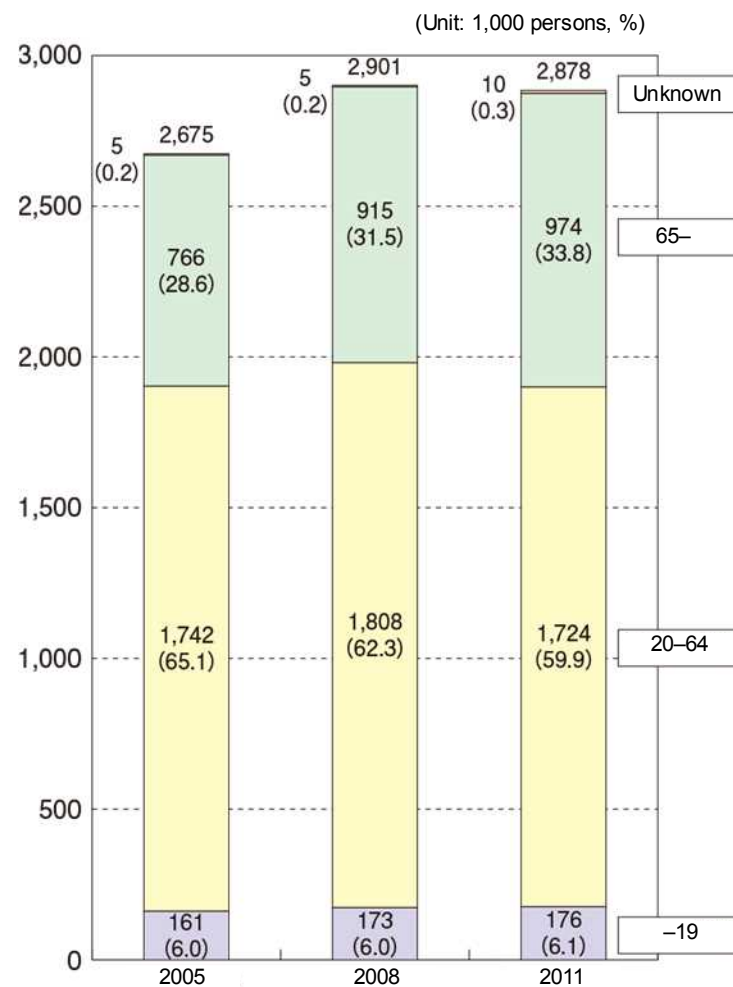

4. Changes in the number of persons with disabilities by age group (children and persons with intellectual disabilities, at home)



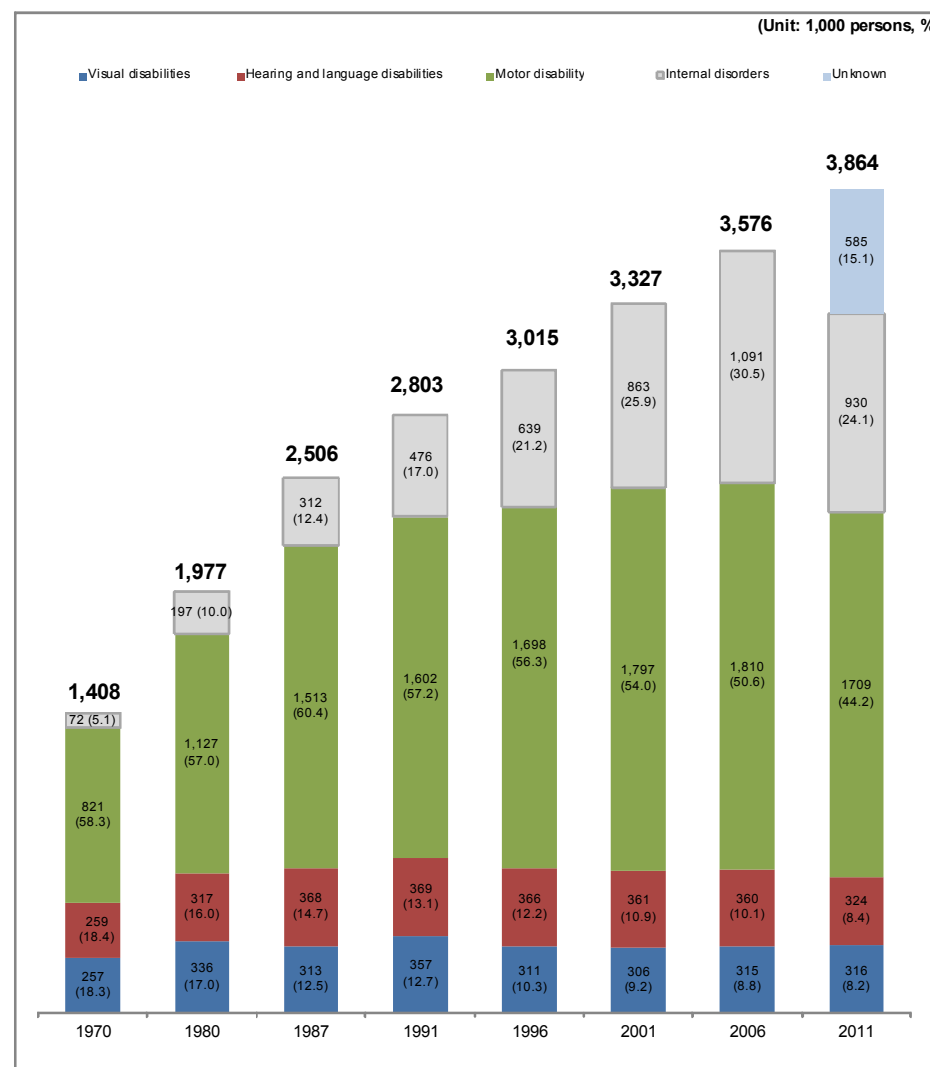

5. Changes in the number of persons with disabilities by age group (persons with mental disabilities, outpatients)



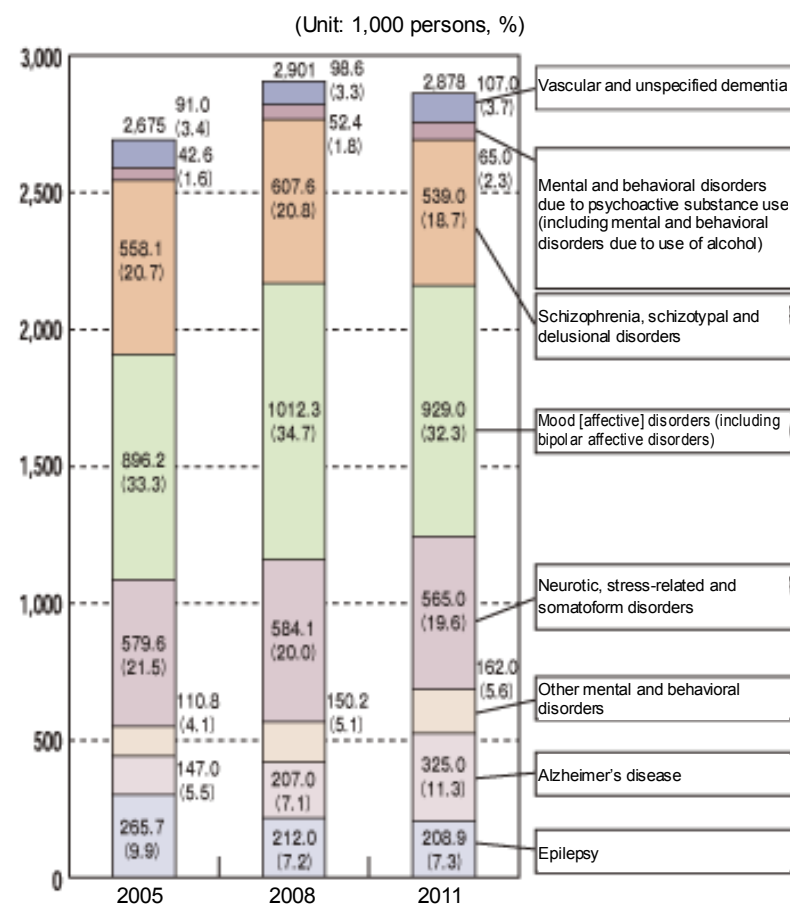

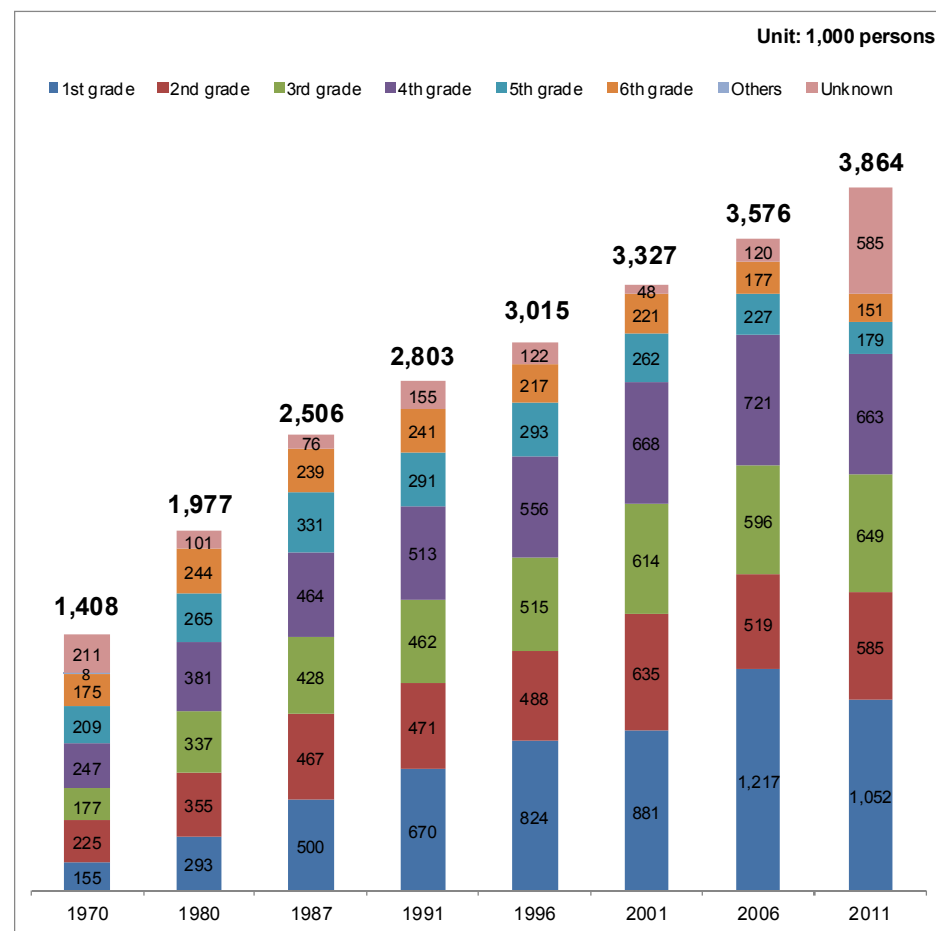

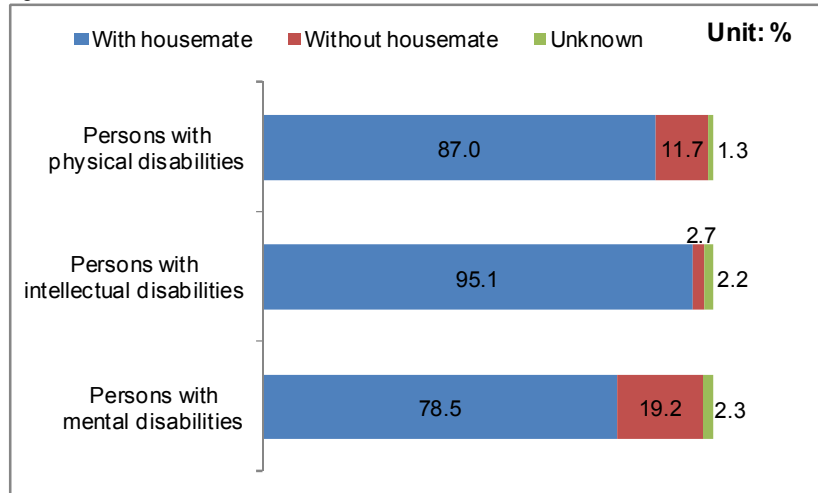

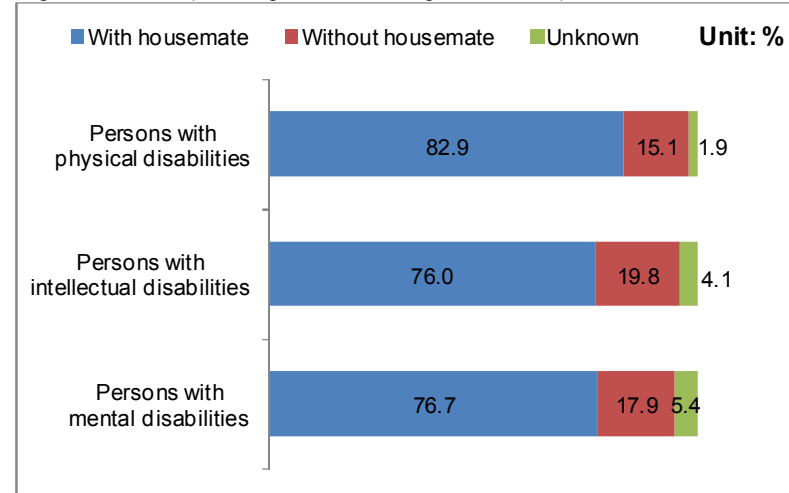

Aged less than 65



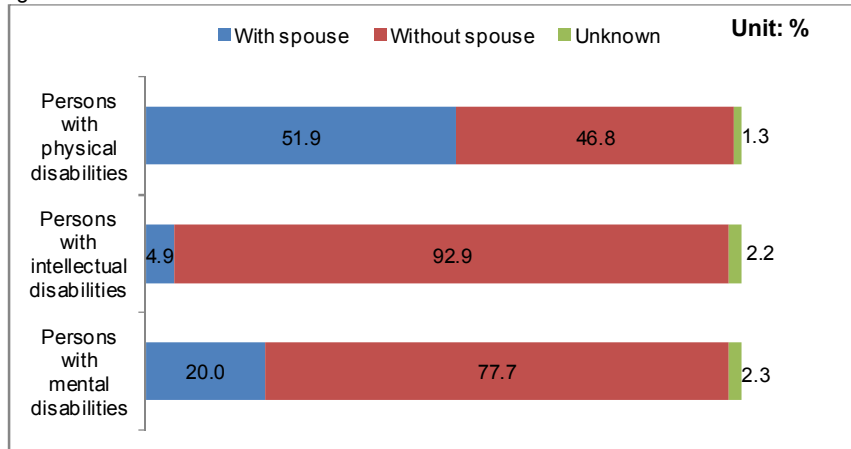

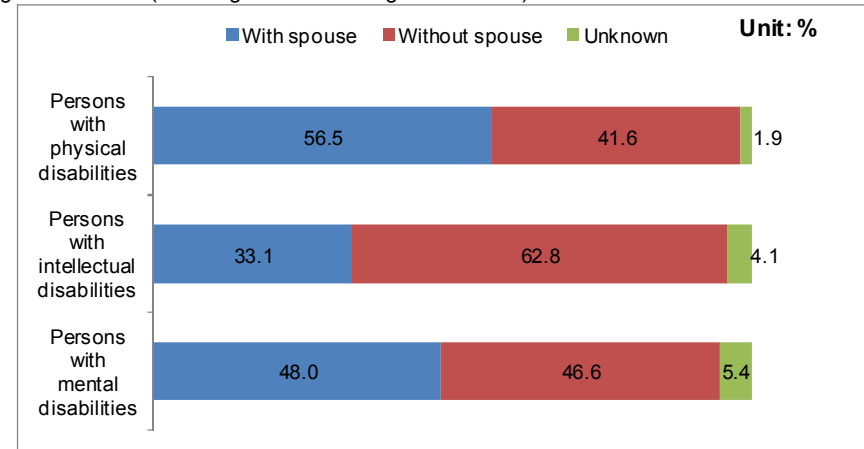

Aged 65 or more (including cases where age is unknown)

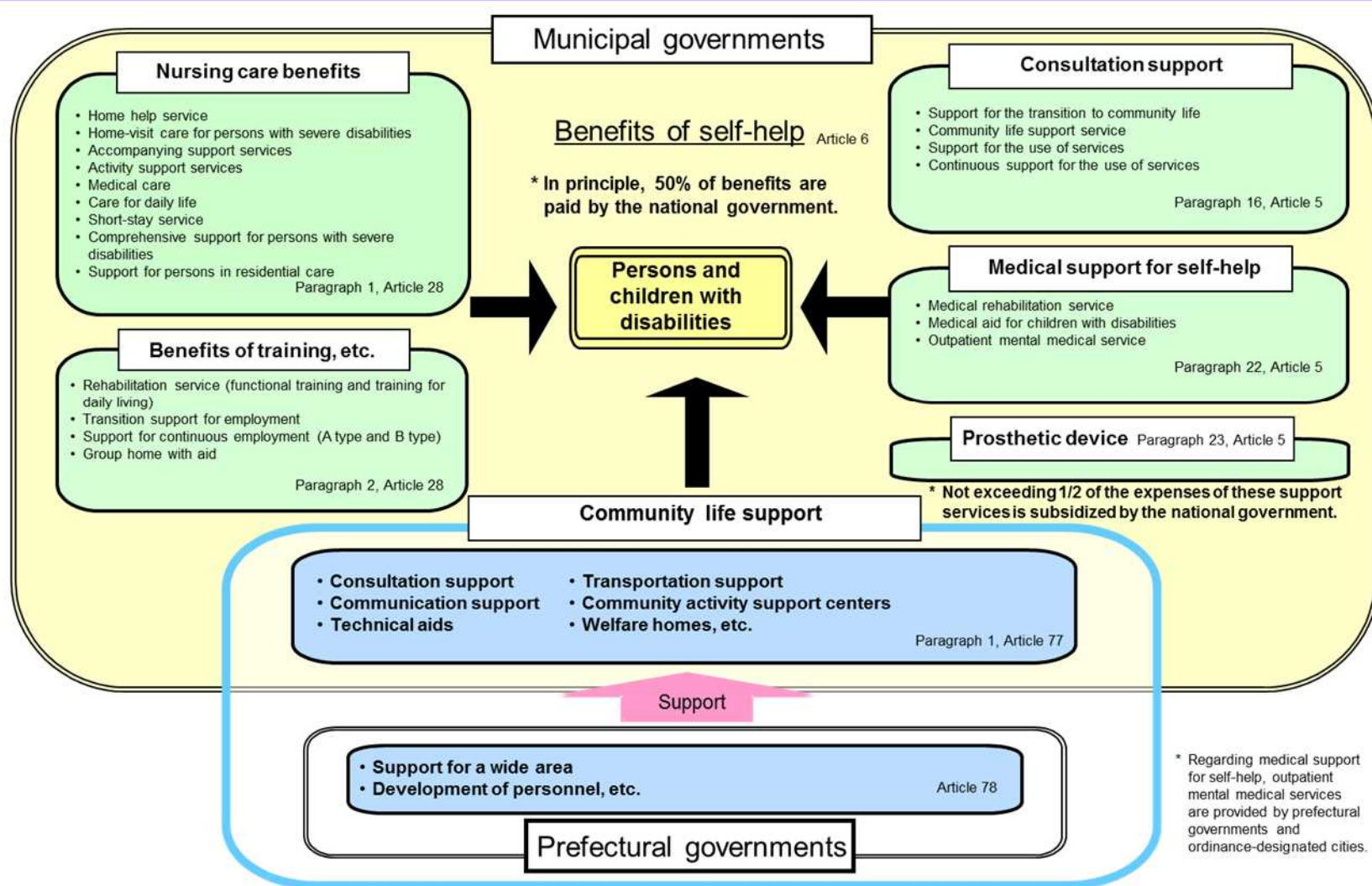

### ○ The 4th Period Plan for Welfare for Persons with Disabilities (aggregation of target values)

- It is decided that a prefectural or municipal Plan for the Welfare of Persons with Disabilities must cover a period of three years. For the 4th Period Plan for the Welfare of Persons with Disabilities, which covers FY2015 through FY2017, target values established by all prefectures were aggregated.
- A Plan for the Welfare of Persons with Disabilities must be established in accordance with the basic guiding principle established by the national government (Public Notice of the Minister of Health, Labour and Welfare). The basic guiding principle has established performance targets for the transition to community life and employment.

- \* [Target values] Performance targets established in the basic guiding principle of the national government.
- \* [Aggregated values] Aggregation of target values established by all prefectures.

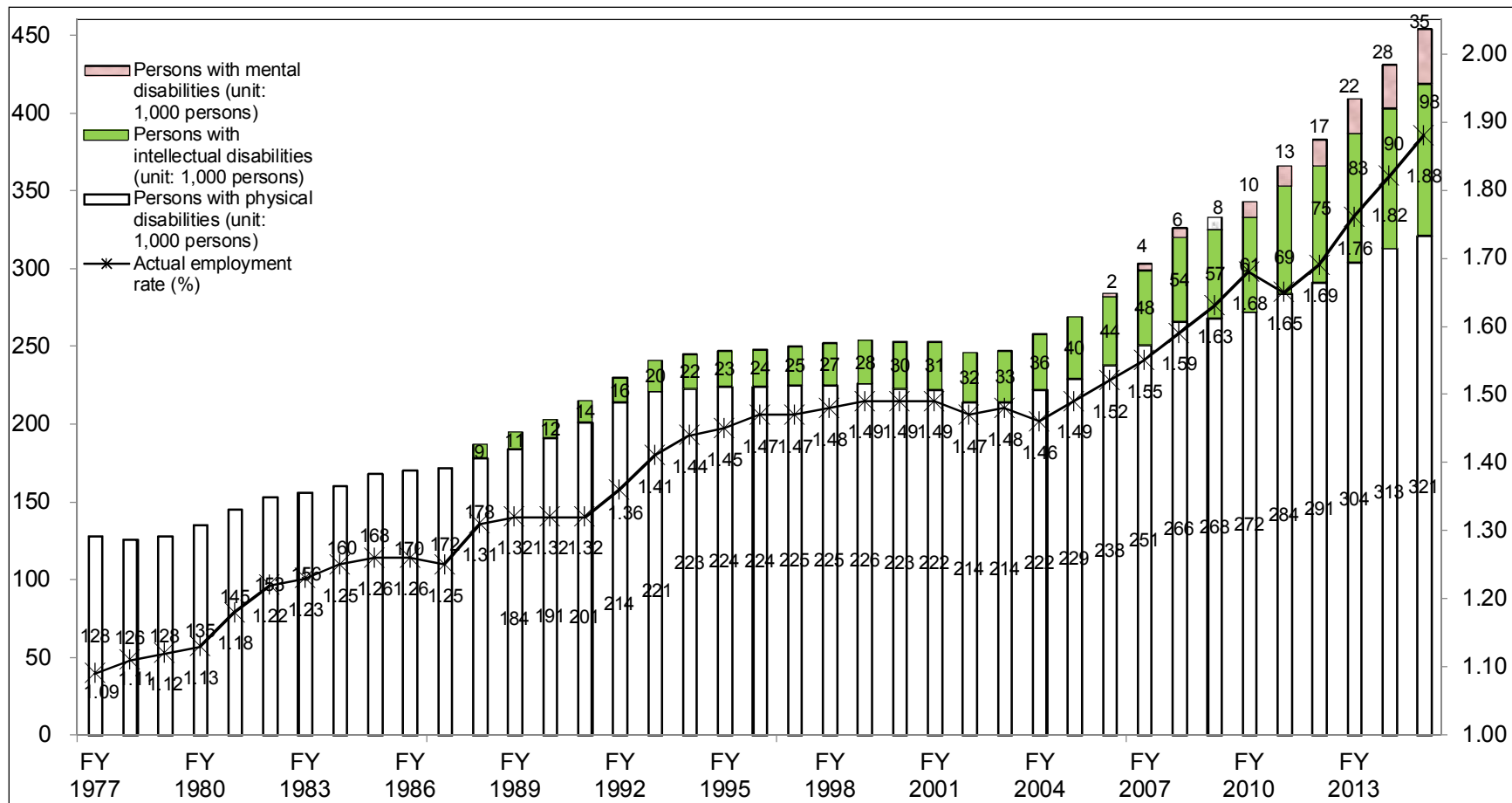

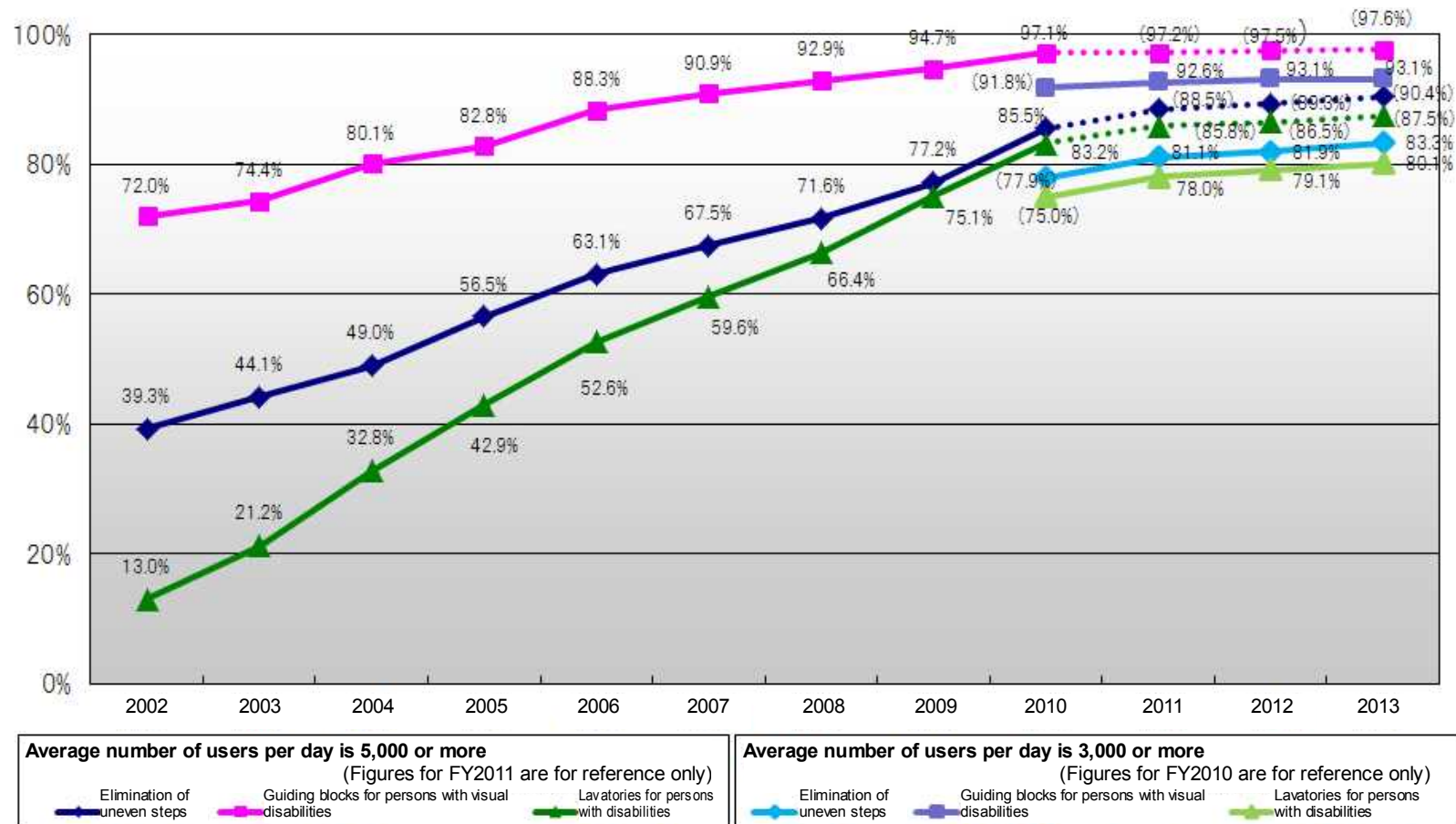

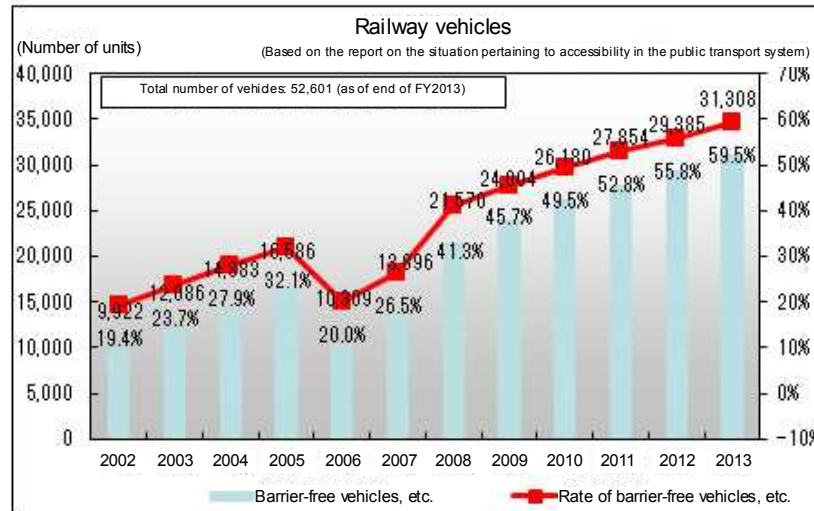

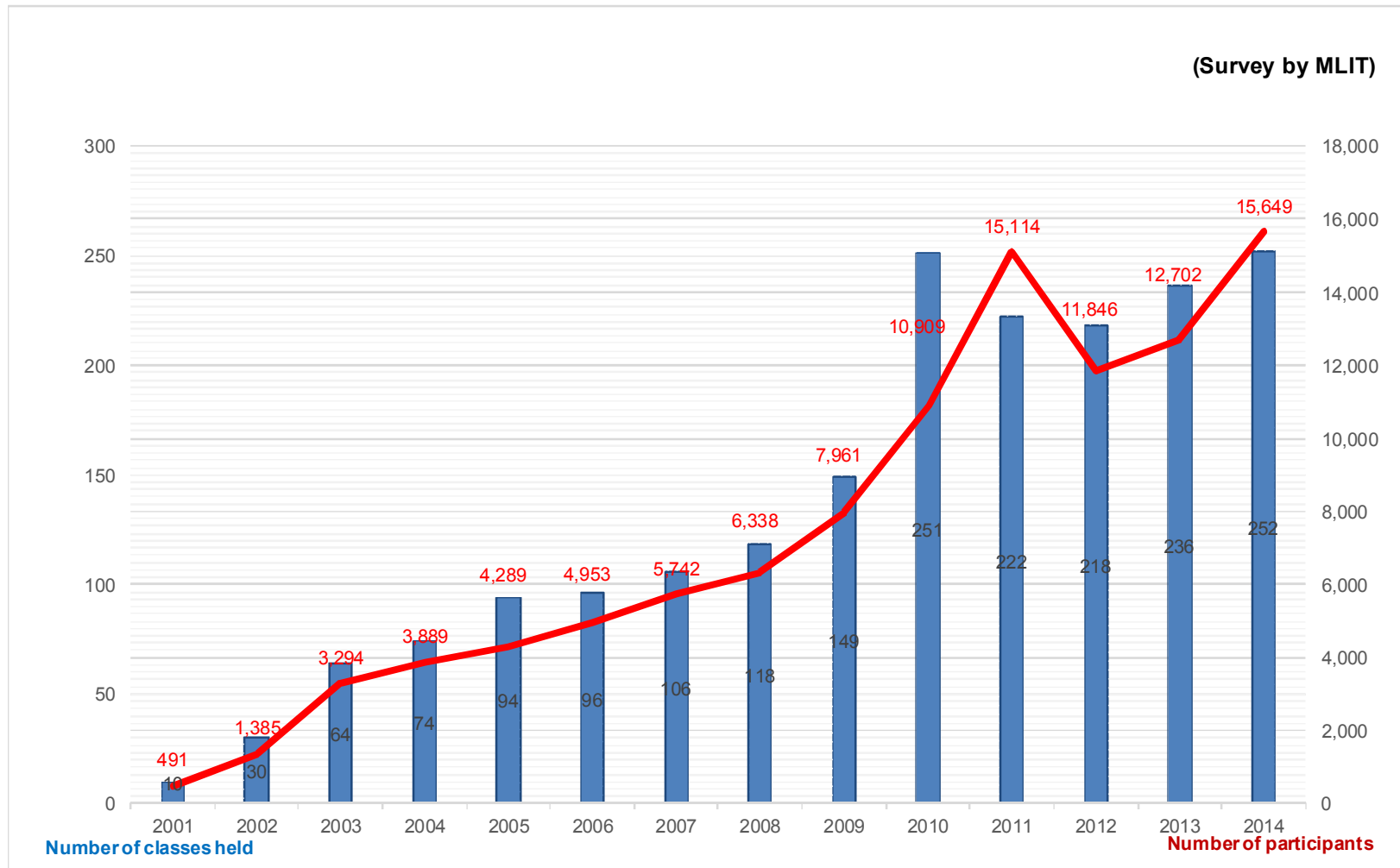


#### 40. Trend regarding the promotion of barrier-free vehicles, etc.
