



Addressing IUU Fishing as a Global Threat for Sustainable Fisheries

Growing importance of addressing IUU Fishing

- > Not only a threat to sustainable fisheries, but also multifaceted problems
- > Global issue with significant regional impacts
- > SDG Target 14.4 advocating international commitment to end IUU fishing
- > Important agenda at international forums and panels





Barriers for Combatting IUU Fishing

Lack of political will, data transparency and law enforcement capabilities



Further international cooperation and coordination is needed!



Japan's Efforts and Contribution to Combatting IUU Fishing (1)

Bilateral Cooperation

- > Assistance to developing countries through ODA, such as
 - provision of monitoring vessels to several African and ASEAN countries
 - capacity building programs for Pacific, African and ASEAN countries

Japan's Efforts and Contribution to Combatting IUU Fishing (2)


Multilateral Cooperation

≻Contribution to RFMOs

- Preparation of IUU vessel list (NPFC)
- Designing and implementing Conservation and Management Measures (WCPFC)

➤ Multilateral Agreements

- Agreement on Port State Measures to Prevent, Deter and Eliminate IUU Fishing (PSMA)
- Agreement to Prevent Unregulated High Seas Fisheries in the Central Arctic Ocean





> Cooperation with international forums and organizations

- Confirmation of commitment in deliverables of leaders meetings (cf. G20 Osaka Leaders' Declaration)
- APEC Roadmap on Combatting IUU Fishing (2019)



Towards Strengthening International Cooperation for Sustainable Fisheries

- Raise international community's awareness of IUU Fishing
- > Continue to address the issue as global and diplomatic agenda
- > Engage non-cooperating entities, not isolate them
- > Enhance data transparency and information exchange
- > Increase dialogue between relevant stakeholders, academia and think tanks
- Reinforce effectiveness of PSMA
- > Encourage non-contracting parties to join the Agreement



- Continue to support capacity building of developing countries
- ➤ Key to enhance monitoring, control, surveillance and law enforcement capabilities
