What is TICAD?

Tokyo International Conference on African Development

- Summit-level international conference on Africa's development initiated by Japan in 1993. This year marks the **30th anniversary**.
- Co-organized by the Government of Japan, UNOSAA, UNDP, World Bank, and AUC.

Summary of TICAD 8 (27-28th August 2022 in Tunis)

- In addition to Japan and African countries, Japan-AU
 Parliamentary Friendship League, international organizations, private companies, and civil society organizations have participated in various forms.
- There were 3 plenary sessions (Economy, Society and Peace and Stability), Business Forum, the Fourth Hideyo Noguchi Africa Prize Award Ceremony were held.
- Prime Minister KISHIDA stated that Japan aspires to be 'a partner growing together with Africa'.
- Focusing on people as individuals, specifically 'invest in people' and 'the quality of growth', Japan pledged to invest US\$30 billion as the sum of public and private financial contribution.

- Pioneering initiative on African development
- Inclusiveness and openness multilateral framework
- Respect for African ownership and international partnership



TICAD 7(2019) Yokohama

History TICAD (1993, Tokyo) Provided an opportunity to bring back global attention to Africa in Post-Cold War era. Clearly articulated priority policies and actions. Highlighted the importance of TICAD II (1998, Tokyo) ownership and partnership. Agreed on expanding partnership to include Asian countries. Focused on the concept TICADIII (2003, Tokyo) of human security. TICADIV (2008, Yokohama) Established the follow-up mechanism. Advocated for the Quality Growth and promotion of trade and investment through TICAD V (2013, Yokohama) public-private partnerships. Announced investment for Africa's future through quality infrastructure investment, TICADVI (2016, Nairobi) human resource development, etc. Mainly focused on African business. Debated based on 3 Pillars; Economy, Society and TICAD 7 (2019, Yokohama) Peace and Stability. Investment focused specifically on 'invest in people' and 'the quality of growth' TICAD 8 (2022, Tunis)

SHEP (Smallholder Horticulture Empowerment & Promotion)




 Launched at TICADV in 2013

Access to Safe Water



Launched at TICADIV in 2008
Constructing water facilities and training over 5,000 staff, to secure access to safe water for over 6.5 million people (2008-2012).

Water Security Action Team

- Launched at TICADIV in 2008
- 272 volunteers were dispatched to 21
 countries (2008-2020) to work on the ground for people in rural areas

 - Advancement of regional and sub-regional integration
 - Establishment of the AU's Agenda 2063, transition from MDGs to SDGs
 - > External changes in global geopolitical and economic contexts
 - > AU's permanent membership in the G20
