Resource rich developing countries face several constraints when negotiating and monitoring complex contracts



Key Constraints

Internal:

- Capacity and capability challenges
 - Weak legal and regulatory frameworks
 - Lack of specialized knowledge
- Difficulties in retaining qualified and experienced staff
 - High staff turnover in key government agencies
- Asymmetry of information
 - With respect to key variables of transaction

External:

- Industry factors
 - influencing mandate leading to the contract negotiations
- Fiscal and legal environment

These are complex challenges and RDBs can play a key role in helping manage them



Risks may be unbalanced between the investors and the country



RDBs can play a role in influencing a coherent mandate to support development of a negotiation strategy leading to equal partnerships

How RDBs can help?

- Provide technical assistance and legal support including direct advice during negotiations
- Proactively identify and manage contract implementation related risks
- Provide countries with alternatives to financing development
- Help developing countries increase negotiating power

How does ADB help?

- ADB has mainstreamed capacity development into its operations:
 - 60% of ADB's technical assistance
- ADB helps developing member countries to negotiate and administer complex contracts:
 - Helps government in the planning process, project management, and negotiating capacities
 - Supports development of DMCs capability to administer long-term complex contracts
 - Involves (and finances) experts to provide consultation for contracts



How does ADB help?

- Provides support for procurement supervision and administration of complex contracts:
 - Learning and support, including project preparatory work
 - Technical support for negotiation of complex contracts by building capacity and skills through trainings
- Promotes information and dissemination of development knowledge:
 - Knowledge management and capacity development on negotiation approaches and techniques involving government and private operations
 - Partnerships throughout the Asia and the Pacific region countries, and with global institutions to foster the creation and dissemination of development knowledge, and training programs



Some examples

- ADB and OECD jointly manage an Anti-Corruption Initiative to promote transparency and curb corruption:
 - Fostering policy dialogue through Steering Committee Group Meetings and Conferences
 - Policy analysis, including thematic reviews
 - Regional seminars
- Providing strategic policies and advice for developing backward and forward linkages for extractive industries:
 - Promoting good governance and transparency in the use of oil, gas, and mining revenues in resource-rich countries, e.g.
 Extractive Industries Transparency Initiative (EITI)



Some examples

- Advisory and technical assistance to Mongolia (2015) to help build the capacity of local governments and non-mining private sector participants:
 - Value-chains for investment planning and market analysis
 - Learning-by-doing approach and in-house training sessions to address the capacity and institutional development in the country
- Technical assistance loan to state-owned asset management firm in Mongolia to strengthen the firm's institutional and management capacity, that will support Mongolia's economic development



Conclusion

- Countries face capacity and capability constraints when negotiating and monitoring complex contracts
- Governments need an effective negotiation strategy and an action plan
- RDBs are well placed to help in capacity development and service delivery, including contracting modalities and management
