4. Voice from Participants

♦ Japanese American Participants

I really enjoyed the lecture about emigration/Nikkei/immigration. It definitely helped me learn more about my cultural heritage as kind of a strange mix of cultures (Franco-American citizen with Japanese-Vietnamese ethnicity). I now know how self-identification is important to me and the histories of my ancestors.

The school exchange was a great way of immersing ourselves in Japanese culture with students of our age who shared many experiences. It was extremely fun.

♦ Youth Exchange Program: University Student

I really enjoyed sharing ideas with Japanese-American students since we could talk frankly each other. As I've heard most of them are Japanese-American, I expected that they had come to Japan before, and they can speak Japanese. However, it made me surprise that most of them never come to Japan, nor that they know Japan very few. I hope this cultural exchange program become a good opportunity to know more about Japan for them.

Although I was a bit nervous since I haven't communicated with exchange students for long, I become very good friends with KAKEHASHI project participants as if we are old friends, thanks to their friendliness and cheerfulness. I am happy to be able to participate in this cultural exchange program, since this opportunity encouraged me a lot to study abroad which I have been thinking of. I even enjoyed communicating with their broken Japanese, which gave me an impression of their humbleness and their Japanese sprits which I felt more than people in Japan today. I am hoping more and more people from foreign countries participate this KAKEHASHI project in order to disseminate wonderful parts of Japan to the world, and then this project will literally become KAKEHASHI to world peace.
