

KAKEHASHI Project (United States of America) Inbound program for KAKEHASHI Inouye Program the 2nd Slot Program Report

1. Program Overview

Under the "KAKEHASHI Project" of Japan's Friendship Ties Program, 25 Japanese Americans and supervisors from the U.S. visited Japan from March 4 to March 11, 2019 to participate in the program aimed at promoting their understanding of Japan with regard to Japanese politics, economy, society, culture, history, and foreign policy. Through the lectures, observations and interactions with Japanese people etc., the participants enjoyed a wide range of opportunities to improve their understanding of Japan and shared their individual interests and experiences on social media. Based on their findings and learning in Japan, each group of participants made a presentation in the final session and reported on the action plan to be taken after returning to the U.S.



The lectures at each location showed the true culture of Japan and the lifestyle each locality maintained. Without these lectures on culture, understanding their lifestyle in Japan would have been difficult. Each lecture showed the community of each town and how different each city of Japan was in culture even in the same country. The school exchange was an experience that will stay with me for the rest of my life. The students we met made

connections through experiencing each other's culture in our own home country. An experience like this is unparalleled because we are the same age and have many things in common. Even if language and culture are different, through origami, karaoke and local experiences in Japan, we made life-long friends. When the students visited us, we shared our culture in the same way with eating burgers and hanging out by the beach. The experiences we shared together in this program helped us overcome a language barrier and a cultural barrier which was virtually non-existent after figuring out how to make paper cranes and dance the hula together.

I was glad HPU students were interested in various aspects of Japan such as our social system, our way of thinking, culture, food, scenery and our school, Fukuoka Jo Gakuin. And their thoughts and comments gave me a new perspective on thing we took for granted or felt negatively about and made me realize what I should learn more. I really enjoyed being together with them as they were joyful, friendly and active. They talked to me just like an old friend even though we have just met a month ago. And I have learned culture and history of both countries through the program. It was a treasure for me to become friends with them regardless of gender and race, and creating a relationship that bridges the two countries of Japan and US.



This is the first time for us to host American students at home. We hosted them just one night. We made TAKOYAKI (a popular snack in Japan) for dinner. Hawaiian students and my children really enjoyed cooking and eating them at a dining table. We also made Traditional Japanese sweets, Sakura-mochi, with our grandparents at the Japanese inn run by them. I hope they liked the taste. We are really happy to be able to have a friendship with the student from Hawaii.
