

KAKEHASHI Project (United States of America) Inbound program for High School Students the 3rd Slot Program Report

1. Program Overview

Under the "KAKEHASHI Project" of Japan's Friendship Ties Program, 50 high school students and their supervisors from the U.S. visited Japan from February 17 to February 24, 2018 to participate in the program aimed at promoting their understanding of Japan with regard to Japanese politics, economy, society, culture, history, and foreign policy. Through the lectures, observations and interactions with Japanese people etc., the participants enjoyed a wide range of opportunities to improve their understanding of Japan and shared their individual interests and experiences on social media. Based on their findings and learning in Japan, each group of participants made a presentation in the final session and reported on the action plans to be taken after returning to the U.S.

I got to try on a Japanese school uniform. Surprisingly comfortable but there were so many buttons.




(Group A) About Homestay (Instagram)


