

JENESYS2018 ASEAN Outbound 5th Batch Program Report Theme: Japanese Culture Exchange (Lao People's Democratic Republic)

1. Program Overview

Under the "JENESYS2018" of Japan's Friendship Ties Program, 18 Japanese high school students and supervisors visited Lao PDR from December 18 to December 26, 2018 to participate in the program aimed at promoting the understanding of Japan with regard to its politics, economy, society, culture, history, and foreign policy. This batch is held under the theme of "Japanese Culture Exchange".

The delegation enhanced their knowledge about the relationship between Japan and Lao PDR, Lao people, culture and lifestyle through the meeting with government officials, observation of Japanese company, Japan's ODA site and JOCV activity site, school exchange, home-visit experience and city tour. During the school exchange program, they cultivated the friendship between Japan and Lao youths, and they delivered a presentation of the attractiveness of Japan. They shared their individual discovery, interests and experiences through social media. In the final reporting session, they reported about both the discovery in Lao PDR and the action plans to be implemented after returning to Japan for government officials and local residents.

4. Voice from Participants

◆ **Student** Isahaya High School)

My first impression on my arrival in Wattay International Airport was that Laos likes Japan hanging Japanese flags, signs, and ramen noodle shops, sushi restaurants and of course Japanese culture are ubiquitous. We visited the embassy of Japan and JICA office, where we learned that Japan has been providing demand-driven support to Laos and forming a strong bond. I do believe that the social bond would motivate Lao people to be very familiar with Japanese culture. This could be seen when we visited the schools. Local students know simple Japanese words such as *Konnichiwa* or *Hajimemashite*. And even some students showed me some photos of their practicing Aikido or Japanese classes they take. What I was amazed the most was that some said their dreams are to study in Japan in the future. I was inspired by their hardworking to try to win scholarship. Their attitude gave me a new perspective.

◆ **Student** (Isahaya High School)

This program widened my perception of Japan realizing that our country is amazing. I'd never appreciated the luxury of access to a bunch of books in the library in Japan or thoughtfulness extended to the hearing-impaired by audible signal appliances. To boot had I not realized that Japan is one of the biggest ODA donors to Laos before I was chosen to participate in this program. Now I feel I am responsible for letting as many people as possible to know these facts as well as paying even more attention to the ODA projects practical for the people of Laos regardless of physical challenges.

◆ **Student** (Isahaya High School)

Laos and Japan have a greater bearing than I thought. Right after I set foot on its land, we saw JICA support memorial stones at the airport and learnt that Lao students are so big fans of Japan. The experience in this program gave me a new perspective to see Japan. For example, how to support Laos people, such as JICA's projects in Laos. By actually visiting the Japan Overseas Cooperation Volunteers, I was impressed by the non-unilateral support that was close to the local people. Secondly what I learned over there is a warm personality of Lao students. There is much in common between Lao and Japanese students. However differences are they have more pride in their country and they are instilled a passion for learning. When we asked them about Laos, they would elaborate on that. On the other hand when I was asked what we were proud of about Japan I could not answer well even we studied about Japan before this visit to Laos. The question still lingered in my mind. It was a discovery that cannot be obtained in Japan.

It was very nice that we met with a lot of students when we visited the schools. Not only meeting new people, but we've still kept in touch with many of them even after we returned. Social media allows us to follow each other knowing what is going on in respective countries.


◆ **Teacher** (Phonesavanh Secondary School)

1. Making and Distributing of our school newsletter

We make a newsletter to distribute among all the students, their parents, teachers and staff and poster it with adequate visibility. It will contain our experience in Laos and attractive features of Japanese culture, its diversity and how we pass the wish for peace from our grandparents, which we realized through this program.

2. Holding the 'Laos Week' event

We held an event called 'Laos Week', in order for the other students to learn Lao culture and the relations between Laos and Japan. We exhibit our photos taken during the program in Laos and show the movies as well. We make this opportunity not only to introduce Lao culture but also to think about Japanese culture and tradition as well.

3. Posting on the local newspaper

We would like to use our courtesy call to Isahaya City Maier after returning to Japan for an occasion to appeal the local media especially Nagasaki Shinbun, one of the most prominent local newspapers in Nagasaki. In an article, we introduce this program to Laos, what we realized through our experience and the attractive features of Japanese culture, which we haven't noticed before.
