

KAKEHASHI Project (Canada) Inbound program for High School Students Program Report

1. Program Overview

Under the "KAKEHASHI Project" of Japan's Friendship Ties Program, 41 High school students and supervisors from Canada visited Japan from January 29 to February 5, 2019 to participate in the program aimed at promoting their understanding of Japan with regard to Japanese politics, economy, society, culture, history, and foreign policy. Through the lectures, observations and interactions with Japanese people etc., the participants enjoyed a wide range of opportunities to improve their understanding of Japan and shared their individual interests and experiences on social media. Based on their findings and learning in Japan, each group of participants made a presentation in the final session and reported on the action plans to be taken after returning to Canada.

4. Voice from Participants (abstract)

◆ Canada, High School Student (Group A)

The school exchange was so fun, Kendo was extremely fun and I found communicating with the students to be the highlight. I learned so much about the Japanese people from talking to the students and I also got to try and use the basic language I have learned, The Toyota Motor Corporation (Motomachi Plant) was very interesting. 
