

# KAKEHASHI Project (United States of America) Inbound program for Jewish Americans the 1st Slot Program Report

#### 1. Program Overview

Under the "KAKEHASHI Project" of Japan's Friendship Ties Program, 15 Jewish Americans from the U.S. visited Japan from February 2 to February 9, 2020 to participate in the program aimed at promoting their understanding of Japan with regard to Japanese politics, economy, society, culture, history, and foreign policy. They deepened their knowledge on the history of Japan-Jewish relations through the lectures and visit to the Sempo Museum, and strengthened the friendship between Japan and the U.S. while reflecting on their own roots by attending interaction sessions. The participants enjoyed a wide range of opportunities to improve their understanding of Japan and shared their individual interests and experiences on social media. Based on their findings and learning in Japan, each group of participants made a presentation in the final session and reported on the action plans to be taken after returning to the U.S.

#### 4. Voice from Participants (abstract)
