

KAKEHASHI Project (United States of America) Outbound Program for KAKEHASHI Inouye 1st Slot Program Report

1. Program Overview

Under the "KAKEHASHI Project" of Japan's Friendship Ties Program, 25 Japanese university students and supervisors visited the United States of America from February 16 to February 23, 2020 to participate in the program aimed at promoting the understanding of Japan with regard to its politics, economy, society, culture, history, and foreign policy.

During the school exchange program, they delivered a presentation and performance to introduce the attractiveness of Japan. Through the observation of various sites, the participants enjoyed a wide range of opportunities to improve their understanding of the US and Japan US relations, and shared their individual interests and experiences through social media. Based on their findings and experience in the US, each group of participants made a presentation in the final session and reported on the action plans to be implemented after returning to Japan.

3. Voice from Participants (abstract)

◆ I suppose the best part of the program was the interaction session when we were paired with the Hendrix College students. At TOKUSEN USA, we learned what was important when a Japanese person works overseas. It was very meaningful to hear directly from a Japanese worker about his experience in the US. At an Elementary School visit, I found that there was a big difference between American and Japanese Elementary Schools. The students at American Elementary School were very positive. I was impressed to see every student raise his/her hand to actively participate in the class. This program was only seven days long, but, I learned a lot. The accompanying students also inspired me a lot as well.

◆ I have always been curious about the impressions American people have towards Japanese people. Although Japan and the US were enemies during WW II, we now have a close relationship in a variety of fields, not just in politics and the economy. With this opportunity to visit the US, we gained so much from our interactions with Americans from our generation, learning about their interests and sharing our thoughts. . It was a great honor to pay a courtesy call to the Governor of Arkansas, Mr. Hutchinson. I think it was a very fruitful program.

◆ I think we learned a lot through the program with a variety of experiences that we seldom have in our daily life. Especially at an Elementary School visit, I was surprised to see an educational policy which was quite different from Japanese one. Specifically, I was inspired to see directly the "Praise and growth" approach the American education system is known for. Witnessing the participations of the American university students at another visit was an opportunity to reflect on my own approach to lectures.


