

# JENESYS2020 Japan-ASEAN, Timor-Leste Online Exchange (Research for the synergy of FOIP and AOIP) Report

#### 1. Overview

[Objective] The ASEAN and Timor-Leste undergraduate and graduate students will have the opportunity to learn about FOIP (Free and Open Indo-Pacific) promoted by the Japanese government, and AOIP (ASEAN Outlook on the Indo-Pacific) promoted by the ASEAN region through lectures and observations. This program was conducted with the main objective of deepening the interest of the participants in FOIP and raising their awareness of the Asia-Pacific region's connectivity by exchanging views with their peers on what they can do to promote cooperation and prosperity in the Asia-Pacific region.

[Participants] Total: 108 undergraduate students and graduate students from the 10 ASEAN countries, Timor-Leste, and Japan.

\*10 ASEAN countries: Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Vietnam.





## ◆ Undergraduate student (Indonesia)






(1) How would you evaluate the online program?




(2) After your participation in the online program, did your expectations to visit Japan become higher?




# (3) What about FOIP piqued your interest during the lecture/exchange of opinions/virtual visit? (Select all that apply)





# (4) How much did your understanding of Japan in each field deepen from before to after the program?

I could see how the JICE staff were using the limited time before the lecture to communicate with the participants, and it made me realize the extra effort they put into events held online with all its limitations.


#### **♦** Visited location





Japan is a country with limited natural energy resources and, as such, thermal power and nuclear one have been its major power generation sources. The feed-in tariff scheme (the FIT scheme) introduced in 2012 has made renewable source energy generation expeditiously developed.

Moreover, tidal power has a very promising future as an electricity generation source. It's believed that tides are more predictable than the wind and the sun. The first tidal power turbine of Japan started in February 2021

[Overfishing (Group 2)]

As an introduction, we would like to introduce a theme bound to run throughout our future posts and presentation: "overfishing", which falls under the umbrella of the theme "Ocean".

Here on out, we're hopeful to share any and all related details concerning facts, challenges, policy initiatives and recommendations related to "overfishing"; so be sure to look out!

Today's article and the recommended policy frameworks:

"Southeast Asia has one of the most diverse marine ecosystems in the world, but overfishing and destructive fishing threaten its sustained existence.

Much of the overfishing and destructive fishing in Southeast Asia is attributable to illegal, unreported, and unregulated fishing (IUU). IUU fishing occurs region-wide, with violators ranging from small-scale local fishermen to large-scale enterprises conducted on commercial fishing trawlers

The main issue is weak fishing regulations among the region's many countries, together with a lack of cooperation on management...

There is also a significant lack of science-based knowledge about the region's marine ecosystems to inform policies that would lead to the establishment of sound models for fisheries management".

## 5. Action plan presentations at the final reporting session



- Presentations by the participants (excerpt)
- We depend heavily on the ocean, but now overfishing by IUU fishing (illegal, unreported, and unregulated fishing) is affecting marine biodiversity, causing long-term economic loss and environmental destruction, and poses a threat to maritime security. In order to resolve these issues, cooperation from various countries is required, including implementation of marine patrols, development of international standards, establishment of protected areas, and support for developing countries.
- Using social media, our group has been sharing not only what we have learned and realized from the program, but also the food culture, events, Japanese language lessons, and recommended anime from Japan and Southeast Asia. We plan to continue disseminating our experiences in this program and about JENESYS in the future.
- We learned that Connectivity has many aspects, including infrastructure investment, human resource development, trade promotion, and cultural exchange, and that Connectivity plays a central role in international politics and the international economy.
- Through the program, we realized once again that Japan and Southeast Asia receive many blessings from the ocean. Knowing that the ocean, which is also a precious tourism resource, is exposed to various dangers such as marine plastic litter and overfishing, we realized that we must cooperate and take action to protect the marine environment.

In order to strengthen cooperation among countries, it is necessary to have exchanges at various levels, including at the diplomatic level, and at the citizen level centering on NPOs and NGOs, as well as student and cultural exchanges, but we youth need to take proactive roles in this process.

• We learned that cooperation and collaboration among countries is of great importance for a country's economic growth, and that the background to introduction, importance and objectives of RCEP are also part of this.
