1. Program Overview

【Objective】 Juntos!! Japan-Latin America and the Caribbean Exchange Program was implemented for the main purpose of utilizing the initiatives of creating a sustainable environment and improving systems in home countries of participants. In addition to learning about examples of Japanese government and environmental business, the participants learned about the connections between Japanese companies and Latin American countries, and examined the cooperative relationship between Japan and the Latin American region on environmental issues.

6 towns in Kagoshima and the Caribbean Community (CARICOM), the host towns for the Tokyo Olympics and Paralympics, met online on 17th. About 40 people of individuals involved of the towns and countries participated. Members of "Unjami," a volunteer group that cleans beaches every day in Yoron Island, presented their activities and exchanged opinions on issues facing their countries and towns.

It is part of the "Juntos!! Japan-Latin America and the Caribbean Exchange Program," an international exchange program promoted by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. It was hosted by the Japan International Cooperation Center.

The 6 participating towns, Osaki, Tokunoshima, Amagi, Wadamari, China and Yoron, are the host towns of Trinidad and Tobago, Saint Vincent and the Grenadines, Saint Christopher and Nevis, Dominica, Grenada and Antigua and Barbuda, all of which belong to CARICOM (14 countries and 1 region).


(snip) Members of the Yoron-cho volunteer group, "Unjami," explained the activities while taking 9 quizzes, including how many beaches there are in the island, the number of days it takes to clean all the beaches in the island, and which country has the most garbage on the island. They said "We want to continue this activity, which is part of the island's culture, in cooperation with young people," and called for "picking up garbage with us to think about the environmental problems."

In the opinion exchange, Carbon, 25, from Antigua and Barbuda, said, "There are many beautiful beaches in my country, but they are dirty with garbage. There are not enough

Therefore, they seemed to be listening to the story from the viewpoint of how they could make use of the disaster prevention measures and administrative efforts in Minamisanriku in their own countries.</p> <p>Kenji Endo, who was the deputy mayor of Minamisanriku at the time of the earthquake, and his group exchanged opinions on disaster prevention. Mr. Endo has been involved in the response and recovery of disaster victims as a town official. Minamisanriku town experienced the tsunami of the Chile earthquake in 1960, so the government has taken disaster prevention measures at a very high level. However, in the Great East Japan earthquake, he said, the tsunami was much higher than they had expected, so he felt that a natural disaster was something unexpected.</p> |

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| | <p>In response, one question, "A tsunami can occur in Costa Rica. What can the government do in case of a tsunami?" was raised. In response, Mr. Endo says it is important to inform the public of the disaster risk in the area using hazard maps and so on. Mr. Endo felt that there were many things that could not be prevented by the power of the administration, and that the administration itself could be struck by disasters, and that it was important for all residents to understand the disaster risk they were living in and to be conscious of protecting their own lives.</p> <p>Other questions covered specific areas such as "What technologies are being used to disseminate disaster prevention messages?" and there was a lively opinion exchange throughout the session.</p> <p>Participants commented, "I was very impressed by the experience of the people in the disaster-stricken area and was able to gain a lot of motivation." and "Because of the coronavirus, we were not able to have face-to-face interactions, but after the earthquake, I felt that just by connecting with people who are alive and talking about our experiences, the strength to unite and bond is strengthened, and a sense of empathy is born."</p> |

UCC Holdings (HD, Chuo-ku, Kobe) is focusing on online seminars for students to familiarize them with activities related to the SDGs through coffee.

The seminars aim to disseminate the industry's efforts for SDGs and deepen understanding among young people who will lead the next generation. (Omitted) On the 9th, the Japan International Cooperation Center (JICE) implemented the program as an international exchange program commissioned by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Simultaneous interpretation was offered in English and Spanish. In addition to Japanese students, 25 people, such as Ministry of Foreign Affairs employees and media workers, from 7 Latin American countries participated.

Ms. Chie Ganno (31 years old), an employee of UCC, introduced general knowledge of coffee and the efforts to solve poverty and environmental problems in producing countries with quizzes and videos. She appealed, "I want to contribute to the development of the coffee industry and make the world smile." The participants asked questions, reported on circumstances of local coffee cultivation and exchanged their impressions, etc.
