1. Program Overview

[Objective] Targeted at students majoring in social welfare, this program was conducted with the main objective of promoting further understanding of Japan's social welfare initiatives by having participants learn about cutting-edge technologies such as rehabilitation robotics, and see how Japan's initiatives address certain issues including the declining birthrate and aging population, which Singapore is also facing, preschool education, and social withdrawal

The participants listened attentively to everyone's presentations, sending messages of support to each other when the other groups were presenting.






