

# JENESYS2022 Japan-ASEAN Online Exchange for High School Student Report (Theme: Peacebuilding)

# 1. Overview of the Online Exchange

[Objective] An 8-day online exchange program (within September/12/2022~September/22/2022) was held for young people from the ASEAN region, with the main objectives of promoting understanding of Japan's peace-building efforts, promoting exchanges among young people as the foundation for future diplomatic relations, and enabling participants to share what they learned in the program and the diverse attractions of Japan with many people through social networking services and other means.

[Participants] Total: 48 high schools students, etc. from 9 ASEAN countries (Note) and Timor-Leste (Note) 9 ASEAN countries: Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Thailand, and Viet Nam





# 3. Voices from Participants (excerpt)

# High School Student (the Philippines)

There are three best points. First is the interaction with the Japanese high school students. Second is the visit to Okinawa to see our host families, and the third one is our interaction with the university students. Those events brought me the strongest impression about Japanese culture, because we had a one-to-one conversation with others. Furthermore, the topics were concise. So even the broad topics like the ones covered with the university students, were easily understood by everyone.

#### ♦ High School Student (Viet Nam)

I like that all lectures are exceptionally informative and provide meticulous details on their respective subjects. Also, all the local guides are very enthusiastic, making me feel regretted that we could not meet in person. Everyone put great efforts in making up for this though, so it was still fulfilling at the end of the day.

# ♦ High School Student (Myanmar)

#### ♦ High School Student (Timor-Leste)

- -The children from Southeast Asian countries where English is not the native language have high English skills, and I felt the difference between their English skills and those of Japanese.
- -We introduced the characteristics and unique culture of our country and prefecture. In particular, the video and other concrete introductions of school conditions seemed to have aroused strong interest among the ASEAN members. They were also surprised at the variety of club activities.
- -I was happy that I was able to share common topics with them, such as favorite Japanese singers and anime, and that they knew a lot about Japanese culture. It made me want to learn more about other countries.






