1. Program Overview

【Objectives】 This program was implemented with the main aim of having the participants learn about disaster prevention and mitigation measures and the use cases/initiatives of ICT* services in Japan, as well as make use of them in their own countries, through lectures on disaster prevention measures using Japan's information technology and direct dialogue with local residents in Minamisanriku-cho, which experienced the Great East Japan Earthquake.





7. Action Plans Presented at the Reporting Session



Action Plan

- From February to March 2023, introduce lessons learned in Japan and good practices in disaster prevention and mitigation to administrative officers and colleagues of the National Disaster Risk Management Unit (UNGRD)*, the Ministry of Science Technology and Innovation, and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (organizations to which the participants belong). February 28 for the UNGRD, March 31 for the Ministry of Science Technology and Innovation, and April 28 for the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.
- Sign and implement an agreement between the UNGRD and Kyoto University.
- Collaborate among agencies, introduce lessons and good practices, and set goals and opportunities.

Action Plan

1. Implementation plan

Further develop ICT to create a national alert system (P-Alert)***. Specifically, build a facility that can transmit quick and efficient information to residents in the event of a disaster.

2. Reason for implementation

To distribute disaster-related information, such as evacuation advisories issued by local,

regional, and national authorities to media, including broadcasting stations and telecommunication companies, so that the information can be released quickly and efficiently to residents.

Specifically, integrate the Early Warning Messaging System (SISMATE) with the Emergency Warning Broadcast System (EWBS) to send emergency messages over a wide area and to develop a national communication protocol.

3. Timing of implementation

From 2023 to 2024

4. Target:

All residents in Peru.

5. Implementing person:

Through cooperation among PCM, MTC, and INDECI**** (organizations to which the participants belong)

6. How

Attract investments and raise funds for the implementation of the action plan, and gain international cooperation for technical assistance while receiving international support for the establishment of an alert system.

***P-Alert: A system to quickly transmit information from an Internet server to mobile devices, mobile phones, smartphones, siren systems, TVs, digital signage, etc.

Mexico



Action Plan

- Strengthen the relationship between Japan and Mexico socially, culturally, economically, and politically.
- Share what we have learned in the Juntos!! Program with the Mexican community and people.
- Share the cultural/social values, tourism, economy, and technology that Japan offers to people from overseas.
- Exchange opinions with Mexicans and people from overseas.
- Pass on knowledge to Mexican organizations conducting research on Japan.
- Each of the participants will seek ways to deepen ties with Japan. They will also share their experiences through personal social networks.
- For 12 weeks from February 13 (until May 5), send information on a different theme each week

with hashtags using photos, videos, reels (part of Instagram Story), and tweets.
