

Juntos!! Japan-Latin America and the Caribbean Exchange Outbound Program (Argentina) Report

Theme: Promotion of Understanding of NIKKEI Community and Youth Exchange

1. Program Overview

[Objectives] This program was implemented with the aim of building friendly relations between Japan and Argentina where Japanese undergraduate and graduate students were dispatched and actively disseminating the attractiveness of each country. The participants observed various facilities and took lectures on the themes of promoting understanding for the NIKKEI society and youth exchange,and deepened their understanding for cultural differences and the history of the NIKKEI communities through exchange with students at local Japanese language schools and NIKKEI communities.

People who were suddenly confronted with the fact that "Your family isn't your real family, they're among the people who killed your real mother." must have been shocked beyond imagination.

Through ESMA, we once again had the opportunity to learn and reflect on human cruelty and the situation under Argentina's dictatorship at the time. The disaster in Argentina at that time is not well known in Japan, but I felt I needed to relearn about other Latin American countries, including Argentina.

7. Action Plans Presented at the Reporting Session (excerpt)



What I learned during the program

- Relations with Japan in terms of industry: We learned that they are seeking operational efficiency through 5S and kaizen and development of new varieties, and they have received technical support from Chiba University.
- Nikkei society: We learned that Nikkei are highly regarded and that 70% of them are from Okinawa. We also learned about the current state of Japanese culture spreading from Nichia Gakuin, etc. to non-Nikkei people.
- Culture: We learned that there are Japanese language schools in Argentina and that Japanese anime and manga are popular. We also learned about the food culture of Argentina, as well as individual-based national characteristics, temperaments, closeness of distance, the effects of inflation, and economic conditions.
- History and society: We learned about the politics of terror and the abduction of young people.
- Action plan

Each member will make an action plan on relations with Japan, Nikkei society, culture, society, and history.

- Member A: As I am interested in teaching the heritage language in the Nikkei community, I will conduct fieldwork in Spanish classes for Nikkei around my university and also disseminate information on social media about the heritage language in the Nikkei community.
- Member B: I will disseminate how many people love Japanese culture in Argentina. I will disseminate the activities of Nichia Gakuin on social media and invite Nikkei as guests to my own radio program.
- Member C: Because I am interested in sanitation environment, health, and social security in Argentina, I will disseminate Argentina's current situation and conduct Latin American studies at the university. I will continue to maintain contact with my friends in Argentina.
- Member D: Due to my interest in Argentina's economic situation, I will set Argentina's

economy as my workshop theme. I'd like to discuss Argentine policies with my friends.

 Member E: As I'm interested in the identity of Nikkei and the politics of terror, I'm going to research and disseminate information about Nikkei around the world. I will talk about the politics of Argentina with my friends and discuss Japan's political issues with them.

The above five people will arouse young people's interest by implementing their respective action plans.



What I learned during the program

- Through my exchange with Nikkei organizations, I learned that Japanese culture is more prevalent among Nikkei people than it is in Japan, but that as generations change, it is difficult to maintain the Japanese language, and it is not easy to go to Japan, in terms of distance and economics.
- During my stay, I was able to learn about the charms of Nikkei in Argentina, which has not yet reached Japan, and activities intended to blend Japanese and Argentine cultures (*jacaranami*, or jacaranda blossom viewing).
- To become more friendly with Argentinians, I thought that the Japanese should actively adopt the idea of sharing and drinking mate tea, which is a sign of friendship in Argentina, and greetings such as hugs and kisses on the cheeks.

In addition to disseminating on social media the attractiveness of Argentina as shown above and what I have learned, each member will share such information with others in their daily lives.
