

JENESYS2022 ASEAN-Japan Online Exchange for High School Students Report (Reconstruction Support of Disaster-Affected Areas)

1. Overview of the Online Exchange

(Objective)

The main purpose of the 8-day program (September 12-22, 2022) was to promote understanding among the youth of ASEAN Member States and Timor-Leste about the efforts to support reconstruction from the Great East Japan Earthquake, to strengthen external communication on the correct understanding of the reconstruction situation and elimination of harmful rumors, and to promote friendship between the ASEAN and Japanese youth.

[Participants] Total: 52 high schools students, etc. from 9 ASEAN countries^(Note) and Timor-Leste (Note) 9 ASEAN countries: Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Thailand, and Viet Nam


