

Commemorating the 50th Year of ASEAN-Japan Friendship and Cooperation “JENESYS U-17 Women’s Football Memorial Cup” Report (Invitation Program)

1. Program Overview

【Objective】 This program was implemented with the aim of promoting mutual understanding and friendship among U-17(*) female football players, invited from ASEAN Member States (AMS) who are expected to be active in the future, through football practice by all 12 teams including the Japanese team, the "JENESYS U-17 Women's Football Memorial Cup," a friendly match, and exchange events. In addition to the football exchange, the youth from AMS experienced Japanese and Okinawan culture and introduced their impressions of Japan and what they learned from the program to their respective home countries through SNS.

The implementation of this program is expected to further develop friendly exchanges between ASEAN and Japan on the occasion of the “Commemorating 50th year of ASEAN-Japan Friendship and Cooperation”.

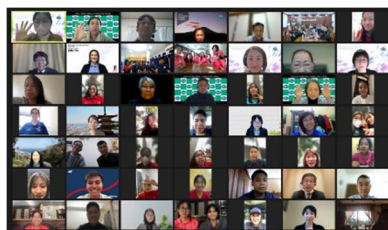

◆ **U-17 Player (Malaysia)**

The games took place over a period of six days, and although it was very hard work, it was a fulfilling period for both the team and me, and we experienced a great deal.
