




There were many questions after the lecture, and based on the fact that they were all pertinent to the content of the lecture, I could truly feel that the participants had listened very closely. Thank you very much.

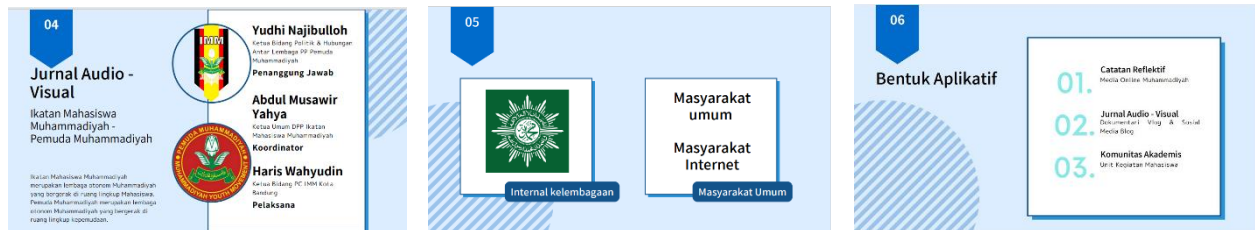

<p>January 27, 2023 (Facebook)</p> <p>On the second day, after a lecture by Professor Ken Miichi at Waseda University, I was very happy to visit the largest mosque in Japan, the Tokyo Camii (Diyanet Turkish Culture Center). In the lecture, I was told that there were 10,000 Muslims living in Japan, including people from Turkey, Pakistan, India, and Indonesia (international students, workers, etc.).</p> <p>...</p>	<p>January 26, 2023 (Facebook)</p> <p>At Ozu Washi shop</p> <p>Day 1 – Ozu Washi (Gallery), Tokyo</p> <p>The year 2023 began with a journey to Japan, the Land of the Rising Sun. This time, I participated in the #JENESYS2022 program as one of the representatives of my organization.</p> <p>...</p> <p>On our first day in Tokyo, with a temperature of about 3 degrees Celsius, we were first taken to Ozu Shoten Co., Ltd. (Ozu History Museum). Here, there is a museum where you can learn about the process of making handmade Japanese paper, a traditional Japanese craft. Ozu Washi has been operated by a company that has been in business since 1653 and has been in operation for nearly four centuries. Here, we were able to learn that Japanese paper is made from kozo (paper mulberry) and is used for partitions (fusuma) and windows (shoji) in traditional Japanese houses. I also found that Japanese paper is light, thin, and stronger than copy paper.</p>

7. Action Plans for After Returning Home Presented at the Reporting Session (excerpt)

Indonesia (Peace Building) (1)



We will share the findings from our visit to Japan with online media and face-to-face communication.

1. A compilation of columns (reading materials) on relevant topics on the site of the religious organization Muhammadiyah
Timing of implementation: February
Implementing person: A person in charge of education at Muhammadiyah
2. Maintenance of audiovisual materials (relevant materials such as V-logs, social media, and blogs)
Timing of implementation: March
Implementing person: Youth group at Muhammadiyah
3. Establishment of an academic community as an activity by university students
Timing of implementation: April
Implementing person: All participants from Muhammadiyah University of Bandung and Muhammadiyah University of Malang

Indonesia (Peace Building) (2)



- After witnessing the cleanliness of the cities during our stay in Japan, we will conduct a "Campaign to separate waste into three categories: paper, plastic products, and kitchen waste."
 - Timing of implementation: February and March 2023
 - Place of implementation: organizations of affiliation in Yogyakarta (universities, religious organizations)
- We will create educational content on "Japan's role for Indonesia" from advanced Japanese technologies, healthy meals, and what we learned during our Peace Tour in Hiroshima.
 - Timing of implementation: March and April 2023
 - Place of implementation: Jakarta

Indonesia (Peace Building) (3)



In Indonesia, we will widely communicate what we saw and learned during our stay in Japan, including Japan's advanced technologies, its sustainable ecosystem, traditional architecture and culture that are cherished even today, and Islam in Japan. As our group has members from the local Islamic organization Nahdlatul Ulama, action plans will also be implemented by each of the five members.

■ Method of implementation:

1. Creating articles
2. Creating podcast
3. Holding a talk show
4. Holding an Instagram live
5. Holding webinars
6. Posting on Instagram and Facebook
7. Holding reporting sessions at university of each member's affiliation

Indonesia (Peace Building) (4)



Among many things we noticed in Japan including that there is no denial of other religions, thorough time management, and consideration of the survivors of the Hiroshima atomic bomb, our group will implement this action plan based on the cleanliness of the cities that we felt in Japan.

■ Title: GOMIBAKUY (Gomibako & Kuy!) *Kuy! means "Let's do something!" in colloquial Indonesian.

■ Purpose of implementation:

- Cultivate disciplined people who don't litter.
- Cultivate people who can separate and dispose of waste.

■ Target: Students of each affiliated university

■ Timing of implementation: Early February to late April

Indonesia (Peace Building) (5)



We will implement two action plans about the conditions for receiving visitors that we learned in Japan to introduce such conditions to other staff members.

1. Implementation of Istiqlal Mosque cultural exchange event

- Content: Wearing Indonesian folk costumes and *yukata*, reporting on JENESYS 2022, setting up photo booths where people can wear *kimono* and *yukata*, Nasi Tumpeng decoration contest, food and craft exhibition
- Target: All employees and staff of Istiqlal Mosque
- Date of implementation: February 10, 2023

2. Holding a workshop for religious tour operation and planning

- Content: Identify issues related to the services of the Istiqlal Mosque religious tour. Clarify the possibility of the Istiqlal Mosque religious tour. Holding talk events by JICE, Ministry of Tourism and past JENESYS participants, and preparing manuals on services at Istiqlal Mosque.
- Target: Officials in charge of Istiqlal Mosque personnel, security, Islamic school, and youth division
- Date of implementation: March 8, 2023

Indonesia (Peace Building) (6)



We will share widely what we have learned and experienced in Japan, such as the experience of the atomic bombing that we learned about at the Peace Tour in Hiroshima and the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Museum, in the form of seminars and articles in Indonesia to help build peace around the world.

1. Holding a seminar at Pesantren (an Islamic boarding school)

- Target: Pesantren (an Islamic boarding school) third-year students
- Date of implementation: March 3, 2023
- Method of implementation: Face to face (offline)

2. Holding a seminar at the State Islamic University

- Target: Students of the State Islamic University Jakarta and also open to outsiders
- Date of implementation: March 16, 2023 (scheduled)
- Method of implementation: Hybrid format (face to face and online)

3. Dissemination of information through articles, photographs, and design

To promote understanding by disseminating information using visual information such as articles, photographs, and design that are easy to share on SNS

- Target: All Indonesians who use the Internet
- Date of implementation (scheduled): February 15, April 1, and April 15, 2023
- Method of implementation: Social media (Instagram, WhatsApp)

Implementation agency: Japan International Cooperation Center (JICE)
