

Remarks by Mr. TSUJI Kiyoto, State Minister for Foreign Affairs

March 30, 2024

I would also like to reiterate my sincere condolences and prayers for the repose of the souls of those who lost their lives. I also pray for peace, and would like to express my heartfelt wishes for the good health of all those attending here today.
