1. Program Overview

[Objective]

• JENESYS Indonesia-Japan Exchange for Diplomats and Governmental Officials I

The main objectives of this program are to provide opportunities for Indonesian governmental officials to deepen their understanding of Japan's initiatives in the maritime safety and fisheries sectors in Japan through exchanges of opinions with related institutions and observations of their facilities, and to have them create networks with related Japanese parties.

JENESYS2023 Brunei-Japan Maritime Safety Exchange

The main objective of this program is to promote cooperation in maritime safety and strengthen human connections between Brunei and Japan by deepening Bruneian governmental officials' understanding of Japan's initiatives and case examples in the maritime safety sector through lectures, observations, and exchanges.

3. Voices from the Participants (excerpt)

◆ Indonesian Governmental Official (Maritime Security Agency)

The most impressive aspect of this visit was the opportunity to meet with members of the Japan Coast Guard and engage in direct exchange with them. I gained the understanding that the Japan Coast Guard by itself has extremely powerful capabilities and a significant budget, which it uses to properly manage and operate the organization. An example is the forming of the Mobile Cooperation Team (MCT). MCT was established for the purpose of providing capacity-building support for the realization of safety and security in the Indo-Pacific region. It creates synergies in cooperation with relevant agencies worldwide and plays a role in addressing maritime threats that may at times endanger national sovereignty. Relevant institutions in Japan provide support in various forms, including training, workshops, seminars, and the provision of vessels. This demonstrates that the Japan Coast Guard contributes to world peace through the development of dedicated law enforcement officials. What we learned from the Japan Coast Guard has motivated us young personnel in the field of international cooperation to continue our capacity building efforts without being content with the present. When looking at the state of the Japan Coast Guard and the Indonesian Maritime Security Agency, it could be said that the capacity and personnel of the Indonesian agency is still limited in its capacity to cover the entire territorial waters of Indonesia. However, synergies are being born through collaboration between the Maritime Security Agency and other maritime law enforcement institutions in Indonesia including the Indonesian Marine Police, and these synergies are gradually but significantly improving maritime safety. At the same time, it is also necessary to strengthen cooperative relationships with neighbor countries to maintain a united front against global-scale threats and earn mutual trust.

◆ Indonesian Governmental Official (Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries)

The visit to JETRO was fascinating. Learning about the effects of Japan's initiatives to promote its fisheries products overseas has sparked new ideas for me. I also enjoyed the homestay experience, as it gave us the opportunity to directly interact with Japanese people while learning about Japanese culture.

The markets in Japan are impressive. Japan's sophisticated and intelligent products are certainly a good reason for many more people to learn about Japan's technologies as part of economic growth. There is no other country where it is possible to study such cutting-edge machines and technologies as Japan.

For a start, it would be wonderful if Brunei and Japan could collaborate, such as by forming a cooperative arrangement with the Brunei Ministry of Education to offer scholarships for students to study in Japan, or promoting interesting research that explores solutions to Brunei's complicated economy.

The visit to the Japan Coast Guard was spectacular. It was highly informative, giving us a good frame of reference for finding ways in which we may contribute to our own country. All scheduled items were implemented as planned, and what's more, they were appropriate and clear. Specifically, the first presentation by a Japan Coast Guard employee provided details of the Japan Coast Guard's history and budget. I was surprised by how large the budget is to protect Japan's waters from threats. I was also impressed with the Mobile Cooperation Team's demonstration of arresting criminals. Lastly, the observation of a patrol vessel allowed us an upclose look at the ship. It was not large, but it was meaningful to personally view the ship that is used to protect Japan's coastal borders. Members of the Japan Coast Guard who were involved in the program were extremely kind and professional.

We spent the weekend with a family in Kamogawa City. The host family introduced us to the daily lifestyles and culture of the local people, in one night. Shodo is a form of art in which characters are written on paper using ink, a brush, and other special tools. Self-control (a clear mind and peaceful spirit) is the key to

writing well. Takoyaki is a round, ball-like food that is popular in Japan. It originated in Osaka and spread throughout the country. There are regional variations to Takoyaki. In Osaka (our host father's hometown), cabbage is not used. The Takoyaki batter is made of flour, soup stock, baking powder, eggs, sugar, soy sauce, octopus, green onions, and Tempura powder mixed with water. We ate our Takoyaki garnished with mayonnaise and Takoyaki sauce, further sprinkled with bonito flakes and dried seaweed.

5. Action Plan Presentations at the Reporting Session (excerpt)

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[Learnings about Fisheries]

- We learned that the Japan External Trade Organization (JETRO) and The Japan Food Product Overseas Promotion Center (JFOODOO) not only collaborate to expand the export of Japanese food products and support exports, but they also play a role in increasing product demand by promoting Japanese food products to consumers worldwide. In Indonesia, specific measures and policies to communicate the appeal of domestically produced goods (particularly fisheries products) to foreign consumers are lacking. To address this issue, it is necessary to widely disseminate the effectiveness of relevant measures to stakeholders and promote a change in mindset.
- We learned that the Fisheries Agency of Japan holds public open events at Harumi Wharf, a government-owned ship pier, to promote children's interest in fisheries science and oceanography, foster their understanding of the roles and duties of research vessels, and to secure future personnel. The Indonesian Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries will begin by disseminating measures taken by Japan to a wide audience.

[Action Plan]

Members of the Fisheries Group who participated in the inbound program plan to engage in the following at the government building of the Ministry of Marine Affairs and Fisheries in October 2023.

- Bazaar of fisheries products
 - We will set up a booth in a bazaar which attracts many people from both within and outside the ministry who wish to purchase fisheries products. At the booth, we will interact with visitors by introducing Japanese foods such as Takoyaki and Futomaki sushi rolls. Through this event, we aim to share the knowledge and insights we gained in Japan and deepen their understanding of fisheries.
- Creation of video contents
 - We will create and share videos about Japan via platforms such as TikTok and YouTube, incorporating the "How to" format that is recently gaining popularity. To attract viewers' interest, the videos will present a mix of approachable topics such as "How to use the toilet in Japan" and more serious contents such as "Fisheries research vessel tours in Japan." Through these videos, we will share our perspectives on Japan to a wide audience.

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[Learnings about Fisheries]

Smoking in Japan

In Japan, there are smoking areas almost everywhere, including the Japan Coast Guard building, stores, and hotels. Smoking is generally not allowed, and strict measures are in place to separate smoking and non-smoking areas and to provide ashtrays where necessary. We learned that smoking is not allowed in places where there are no ashtrays.

Smoking in the Indonesian Maritime Security Agency

Unfortunately, in Indonesia's maritime safety institutions such as the Maritime Security Agency and Marine Police, no initiatives are taken to install ashtrays in smoking areas. Smoking may appear to be a minor issue at a glance, but it poses a serious problem. The image shown (center) captures a marine fire which occurred on the ship of the Marine Police in South Sulawesi. The fire resulted in severe damage in the form of precious personnel and equipment being lost. Marine fires are extremely dangerous, as they allow no room for evacuation. In the case of land fires, safety can be secured by moving away from the site of the fire, but in the case of a marine fire, there is nowhere to escape. This particular fire was found to be a consequence of an unextinguished cigarette. To prevent similar tragedies, it is urgent to firstly secure smoking areas and install ashtrays in these areas.

[Action Plan]

The Maritime Safety Group (Maritime Security Agency and Marine Police) formulated a plan to introduce Japan's smoking area system to Indonesia between mid-September and December.

- We will report on the results of the inbound program to the upper echelon of the two institutions
- We will acquire permission from the upper echelon to execute the ideas and measures of the Action Plan
- We will contemplate the method and facility for disseminating the plan to smokers
- We will look for appropriate locations for installing ashtrays
- We will make approaches to smokers to use ashtrays filled with water

[Learnings from the Online Inbound Program]

Our visit to Japan showed us that culture and modernity, and practicality and sustainability, are compatible with each other. There are historical buildings such as the Imperial Palace and Sensoji Temple on one hand, and there are also places like Akihabara that symbolize the latest technologies, animation, and manga culture, on the other hand. Washi, Kimono, and tea ceremony are elements of traditional culture, yet they possess timeless practicality and creativity. In Kamogawa, we experienced the positive attitude and energy of the local people as we interacted with nature and our host families and participated in a local festival. Although Brunei's culture and architecture differ from Japan, the thoughtfulness, sense of gratitude, and teamwork of the Japanese people are also inherent in the people of Brunei. We will never forget how the Japanese people paid due respect to others even when they were tired.

[Learnings about Marine Safety]

Peace and security do not come freely; They are expensive and require an ultimate sacrifice. At the Japan Coast Guard Museum Yokohama, we learned that the Japan Coast Guard assumes a dangerous mission and that collaboration and cooperation with other agencies are indispensable to protecting maritime borders and territorial waters. The Japan Coast Guard has a relatively short history, but it is an excellent, comprehensive maritime security organization that protects national interests and makes a significant contribution on the global stage. Their museum and global initiatives are proof of this. We also learned from the activities of the Japan Coast Guard that both funding and investment are essential to maintaining peace and safety. Their approach serves as a model. At the same time, cooperation and cohesiveness with other countries are also equally important. We realized that there are differences but also many similarities between Japan and Brunei.

[Action Plan]

Within three months after the inbound program, we will share our experience in Japan to a wide audience in Brunei by posting information about Japanese culture on social media. Thereafter, we will collect and analyze the responses to our posts. We will also report to the upper echelon of the Brunei government about the knowledge we gained from the Japan Coast Guard and make proposals. Security dynamics are changing in the surrounding region, and the necessity of a maritime security agency is increasing. Although there are many issues to clear, we plan to work toward the future establishment of a maritime security agency in Brunei.
