Online Japan-Visit Advanced Program for JENESYS ASEAN Alumni Report (Theme: Japanese Language Education)

1. Program Overview

[Objective, Overview]

This programme was conducted from 25 September to 4 October 2023 (9 days in total) for alumni from the ASEAN region who have visited Japan under the JENESYS. Through webinars, virtual tours, discussions with experts, inter-participant discussions and exchange programmes specialising in 'Japanese language education', the programme aimed to (1) further promote understanding of Japan, (2) strengthen networking and (3) stimulate activities by alumni contributing to friendship and cooperation between ASEAN and Japan.

[Number of Participants/Breakdown] Total: 54 alumni from ASEAN Member States and Timor-Leste (participants from FY2015 to FY2022)

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

everyone's feedback which indicated that they appreciated my lecture.


5. Disseminations by the Participants (excerpt)

[Goals and study plans for learning Japanese] There are many ways to learn Japanese, including textbooks, Japanese songs, apps, and anime. It is important to continue studying in whatever way you wish or are able to do. We thought it would be good to interact with Japanese people and people who are interested in the same things as us.

[Action Plan]

We think it would be great if there is a way to have conversations through the partnership system. We think it would also be great if we could learn Japanese in a community.

ingredients in Japanese cuisine (Nagoya-meshi) could be prepared in our own countries, we thought it was a type of Asian cuisine rather than something completely different. From the lectures of the alumni (living in Japan), we learned that we can improve our Japanese by participating in events that interest us, and that we can contribute to promoting relations between ASEAN countries and Japan.

[Goals and study plans for learning Japanese] The goal of learning Japanese is to travel to and/or work in Japan, and if you are a teacher, to teach what you have learned to students. We can find Japanese friends in a community or online, or go to a Japanese language school.

We will create videos and other things that promote Japanese on Facebook and other social networking sites. Alumni who are teachers will share what they learned with their students in workshops and other events.
