INTERNATIONAL PRINCIPLES ON WOMEN IN TRADE

- The United Nations promotes gender equality and women's empowerment through various principles, such as the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), specifically SDG 5 (Gender equality)
- The World Trade Organization supports the Buenos Aires Declaration on Trade and Women's Economic Empowerment, aiming to make trade policies more inclusive
- The International Labour Organization has several conventions aimed at promoting gender equality in the workforce, including those that impact trade sectors
- The Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development provides guidelines on gender equality in trade policies and practices





BARRIERS FOR WOMEN IN TRADE

- Disparities in access to capital for female entrepreneurs
- Lack of access to comprehensive market data and trade networks
- Societal expectations and cultural norms can restrict women's mobility and access to business networks
- Lower levels of technological literacy among women in certain regions
- Legal restrictions on business ownership and operation for women



3. TRADING WITH JAPAN



EXAMPLES

Example 1 - High tariffs and stringent emissions standards for exporting electric vehicles to Japan

- The Chartered Institute educated a GB exporter on the benefits of the UK-Japan Comprehensive Economic Partnership Agreement (CEPA)
- We also organised compliance workshops and certification guidance
- The trader was able to utilise CEPA's tariff reductions, achieve emissions compliance and enhance market competitiveness

EXAMPLES

Example 2 - Navigating Japan's customs procedures for exporting fashion items

- The Chartered Institute provided detailed guidance on the correct classification and valuation of goods
- We also organised workshops on Japanese customs procedures and compliance
- This led to efficient customs clearance, reduced risk of misclassification and timely delivery to Japanese retailers
