

JENESYS2024 ASEAN - Japan Students Conference Report (Invitation Program)

1. Program Overview

[Objective] This program was implemented with the aim of enabling youths from ASEAN Member States (^{Note)}, Timor-Leste and Japan to learn about ASEAN-Japan relations, share awareness of common issues in the Asian region, and exchange opinions on how to overcome them. The specific objectives were: (1) to help participants realize their own abilities and potential, fostering a sense of social contribution; (2) to promote mutual understanding while recognizing cultural diversity; and (3) to strengthen the friendship and cooperation network among the youth of participating countries.

(Note) ASEAN Member States: Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Lao PDR, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, Viet Nam

[Overview] From January 14 to 21, 2025, 106 university students from ASEAN countries and Timor-Leste visited Japan to attend the "ASEAN-Japan Students Conference" (held from January 18 to 20 in Tokyo). Prior to the conference, the group was divided into three thematic groups: "Maritime Security and the Rule of Law" visited Shizuoka Prefecture, "Climate Change and Energy" visited Chiba and Miyagi Prefectures, and "Cultural Preservation and Education" visited Tochigi Prefecture. Through lectures and observations related to their themes, they learned about Japanese examples. Additionally, they experienced homestays and local cultures, sharing the attractions of Japan with many young people via social media. During the "Students Conference," nine Japanese university students also participated, discussing each theme and considering what young people can do to solve these issues. On the final day, they presented action plans (post-return activity plans) at the reporting session.



3. Voices from the Participants (excerpt)

• University Student (Brunei)

The cultural aspect to the cities and towns of our prefecture chosen, Shizuoka, was what amazed me throughout this entire time. I'm so amazed by the landscapes and views of Japan. I can't believe I witnessed stunning parts of Japan within 8 days of this program. And I thank each and every person for accommodating us and making sure we are well fed. I do hope this program continues as it has really motivated me to go back to Japan again to visit the entire country and its culture more in depth.

As a student, the school visit was the most moving experience for me. I have been wishing I could study in Japan, especially in high school. Being a Japanese student sounds so much fun. Sadly, I have no chance to spend my teenager time in Japan. However, going to Utsunomiya High School has fulfilled my dream. I have seen everything I had only seen in the anime and internet and that impressed me the most.

University Student (Malaysia)

I particularly enjoyed learning about the importance of maritime security and other programs related to it. It provided a better insight on how I can suggest my experiences to apply to my country's future expenditures.

University Student (Myanmar)

If I had to pick the most memorable, I would choose homestay and Wakayama Farm. In Myanmar, we have bamboos, but we don't know how to preserve and utilize them effectively. Learning from Wakayama Farm was very inspiring. I also loved the homestay experience because my host father was so kind and warm, like a father figure to us despite the language barrier. We did activities like cutting wood, harvesting vegetables, and visiting an onsen, which made it unforgettable.

University Student (the Philippines)

I was really impressed with the visit to the Utsunomiya high school. They showed us what are the efforts they exerted to provide an improved and developed technologies and Sciences, to maximize its usage and meet its efficacy and effectivity. Another thing is the Homestay with Host Families. They let us experience the traditional Japanese way of living and household, like making the mochi and the calligraphy.

University Student (Singapore)

I was particularly impressed by my visits to Chiba University of Commerce and the homestay experience. Touring CUC opened my eyes to the dedication of both the faculty and students towards sustainability. As someone from a university with similar sustainability goals, I gained valuable ideas to bring back and share with my own university. Although the homestay was brief, it left a lasting impression of Japanese culture. Our hosts were incredibly welcoming, and we had the opportunity to experience aspects of daily life, such as enjoying a Japanese bath, staying in a home with tatami mats, and tasting authentic home-cooked Japanese meals. Additionally, our host family took us to the Minamisanriku Earthquake site, where we learned about the devastating earthquake and tsunami that

struck the area. Coming from Singapore, where we do not experience such natural disasters, this visit was particularly eye-opening. Seeing the height the water reached and the former existence of villages, which are now gone, was a profound experience—one that cannot be replaced by simply viewing photographs.

University Student (Thailand)

I appreciate understanding the organizations and security units in Japan that prioritize building trust with local communities and connecting people to foster an understanding of the environment. This includes raising awareness about creating positive environmental changes. I also admire the strategies and policies employed to promote the value of marine food resources while linking local people to increased income opportunities in their communities.

University Student (Timor-Leste)

One of the most impressive experiences during the exchange program was my homestay. My host family was very kind and friendly, and they had a warm and lively home atmosphere. During my stay, I enjoyed a variety of homemade Japanese dishes and learned a lot about Japanese culture.

Another memorable experience was visiting the university and Sanctuary Center, where we learned about lake water pollution and had discussions about it.

Japan can be said to be the cleanest country I have ever seen. Since the day I arrived, I haven't seen a single piece of litter on the streets or at any place I visited.

ASEAN's biggest success in recent years has been promoting economic integration among members. Hundreds of marine species are negatively impacted by debris, and debris also interferes with safe


navigation and poses a threat to human health.

[Results of the Program]

[Results of the Program]

We learned the effects of the introduction of solar power generation system, preservation of nature by maintaining biodiversity and urban planning, that could help solve energy problems and environmental conservation through observation, lectures, and other programs.

[Action Plan]

We would like to start educational activities immediately after returning to Japan, starting with each member's university and then expanding to the local community, etc., by putting up posters and collaborating with local authorities to raise awareness of waste reduction, energy conservation, and other environmental concerns.



[Results of the Program]

While some activities are government-led, many actions related to energy issues and environmental conservation are noticeable at the private sectors and individual level. ASEAN countries have much to learn from Japan, including education from childhood.

By introducing clean-up activities in public places on FB, photos and videos, we will attract college students and juveniles to this plan and aim for a more sustainable society through cleaning activities in the communities where they live. We plan to continue a long-term basis.




[Results of the Program]

To generate the same amount of energy, which is consumed by using photovoltaic power generation, and by reducing CO_2 emissions through greening. We also learned about examples of waste reduction at the individual level in Japanese.

[Action Plan]

We will try to raise awareness of energy issues at schools and universities in each member's community.

We will also encourage schools to contribute to the reduction of CO_2 emissions through greening activities.



[Results of the Program]

At Wakayama Farm, we learned that traditional crafts (bamboo crafts) are passed down through handson experience. At the Association for the promotion of Traditional Craft Industries, we learned about the beauty of traditional crafts and the close relationship between history and crafts.

[Action Plan]

We will promote each country's culture through TikTok and YouTube. The objective is to get young people interested in their own culture and encourage efforts to preserve it. In the long term, we would like to cooperate among ASEAN countries to increase demand for traditional crafts and preserve cultural assets.




[Results of the Program]

We learned about Japan's efforts to preserve cultural assets. Specifically, preserving handmade crafts in their traditional form, using machines efficiently, collaborating with overseas companies, and disseminating information through social media.

[Action Plan]

We will promote Modoculture, a cultural asset that combines tradition and modern technology, to young people through social media. The content is introducing tangible and intangible cultural assets in an interactive way. In the long term, we aim to involve many young people and to foster cultural ambassadors beyond the national boundaries.





[Results of the Program]

Through our experience in Japan, we were able to learn about the cultures of other countries. After conducting our own research, we also learned that 60% of cultural heritage sites around the world are

somewhat under risk, education is extremely important for preserving cultural properties, and the younger generation is gathering information mainly through online content.

【Action Plan】

We are launching a campaign called AROUND ASEAN on Instagram and TikTok. The purpose is to disseminate accurate information and raise awareness about traditional culture among the young generations of ASEAN, Timor-Leste, and Japan.
