## 1. Program Overview

【Objective and Overview】High school students, undergraduate students, and working youths from Timor-Leste and the Philippines with a high interest in Japanese culture and studying the Japanese language visited Japan from Oct. 22 to 29. The main objective of the program was to increase their interest in learning Japanese and to foster a familiarity with Japan through exchanges with Japanese people. The group visited Tokyo and Hiroshima, where they participated in site visits, school exchanges, homestays, and other activities, and shared their learnings and insights into Japanese culture and language on social media and other platforms.



### 3. Voices from the Participants (excerpt)

#### ◆ **High School Student (the Philippines)**

Starting off with our tour in Tokyo, I really was impressed to see how time really goes fast in Japan as a whole. Their whole country is always on the move to different places as they honor punctuality in every aspect, thus they are always on time. Because of this, it was so nice to see them teach everyone to always be on time, and because of that I was also influenced into being a person that also cares for timeliness.

Moreover, the time we had during the school exchange program in Hijiyama was really fun for me. Everybody was so nice and very caring, and I loved how they were always understanding even if I didn't understand some of the things that they were saying.

Lastly, the homestay was just something else for me. Being able to be immersed in a Japanese household was just so fun and an out of this world experience. My family was so accommodating and so caring. I for one was very impressed with how they do things in a Japanese household, on how they are able to be self-sufficient in every way, wherein they make their own vegetables, meat, milk, and so many more. While on our stay there, we were also given the chance to star gaze amongst the Kita-Hiroshima night sky, where I realized a lot of things about myself. Overall, I really was impressed with how they are here in Japan. Not only their culture and language, but also their history and lifestyle.

#### ◆ **High School Student (the Philippines)**

Locals visiting the temple approached us here and there, and I think we were able to have a one-of-a-kind exchange.

## **6. Presentations of Program Findings and Action Plans at the Reporting Session (excerpt)**

**Locations: Tokyo, Hiroshima – Presentations by a total of 2 groups**

## 【Results of the Program】

## ◆ Learnings about Japan:

Before visiting Japan, our images of Japan were related to music, food, the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki, historical sites, etc. We also heard that the Japanese are very kind, disciplined, hardworking, and friendly.

After visiting Japan, we were amazed to see that Japan is a very beautiful country and that it is very creative and technologically advanced, just as we had seen in anime and manga. In terms of education, we learned that in contrast to the theory-oriented classes in Timor-Leste, practical materials are used in Japan, and that punctuality is very important.

◆ Learnings about the Japanese Language and Culture:

Regarding the Japanese language, we learned new ways of communicating in Japanese, such as using different words depending on the situation or circumstance.

Regarding Japanese culture, we learned that Shintoism and Buddhism are the two main religions in Japan, and that Japanese people are very tidy and respect the observance of the law.

【Action Plan】

We as a whole group will conduct exchange activities from November 2024 to January 2025 to share our experiences from this program with other Japanese language learners. We will visit 1 of 10 Japanese language schools in Dili each week to present our experiences, showing them our PowerPoint presentation and photos.

【Results of the Program】

◆ Learnings about Japan:

Lifestyle: They had an organized and disciplined life. Additionally, they always had ways of doing things in their everyday life such as saying itadakimasu and gochisousamadeshita before and after meals.

Religion: That they have two major religions such as Buddhism and Shintoism

People: The people in Japan are punctual, disciplined, and very sincere when apologizing.

◆ Learnings about the Japanese Language and Culture:

Firstly, we were taught that speaking in Japanese is mostly done in a formal tone and complete structure. Moreover, words in Japanese are to be spoken wholly and nicely. But after the exchange program we learned that people in different places have different ways of saying things, such as how it is different from the language in Kita-Hiroshima and Tokyo City. Furthermore, we also noticed the difference in their way of talking to different ages, wherein we were taught that it should be casual when talking to younger people, but in actuality, it should also be somewhat formal.

【Action Plan】

All program participants will share their experiences and knowledge with students at their respective high schools once or twice a month for three months using the following methods:

- The participants will demonstrate and explain their experiences and knowledge in classes to immerse and explain how Japan works from the perspective of foreign students. Additionally, we hope that students will also be intrigued and become interested in learning more about Japan, its culture, and its language.
- Some participants will showcase their findings in their Japanese language clubs by creating a theme-based club booth during their club fair. They will also publish a feature article for their school paper for the whole school to be aware of what they've experienced and what Japan has to offer.
