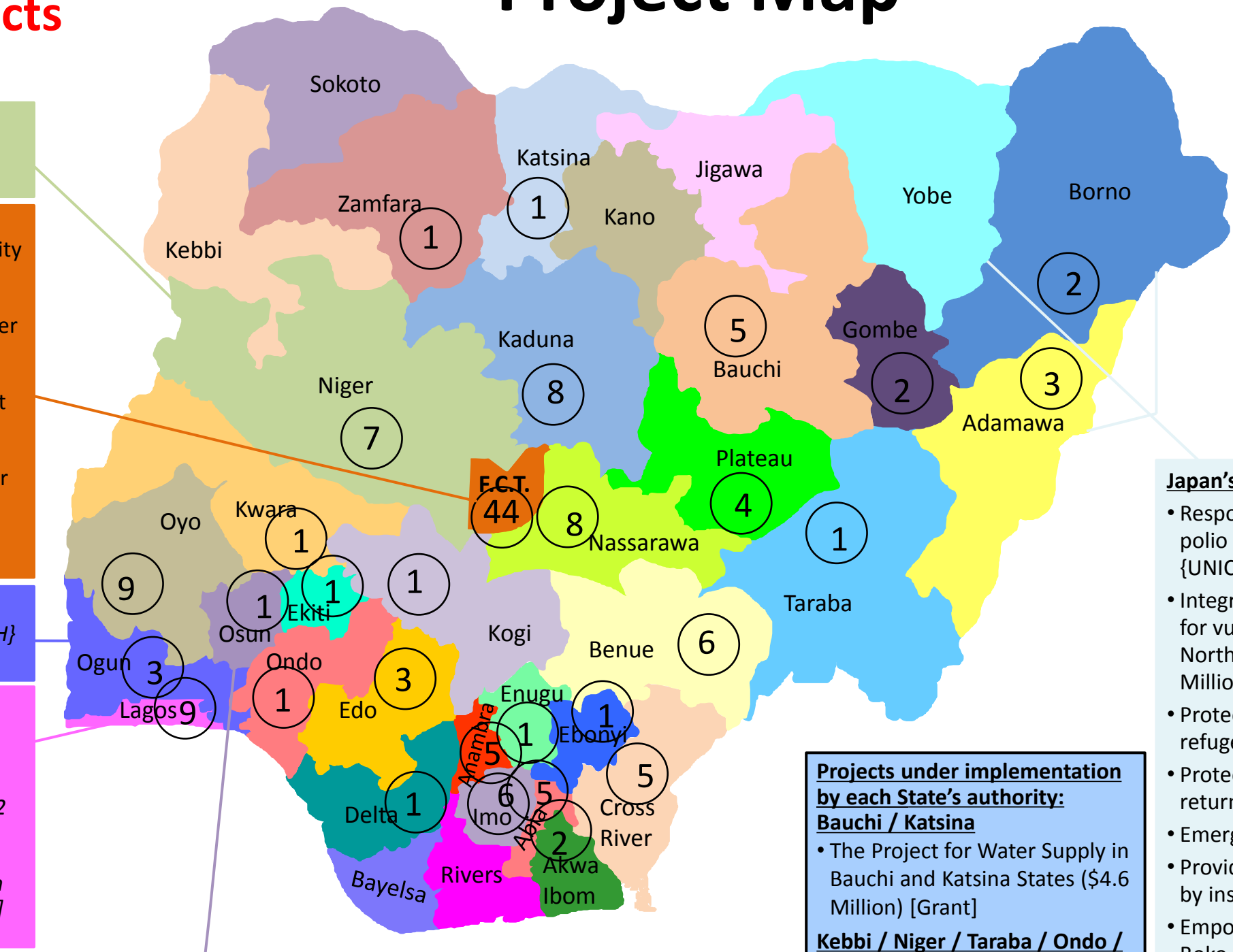


## Japan is the largest export destination of Nigeria's LNG\* & Sesame Seeds\*\*
