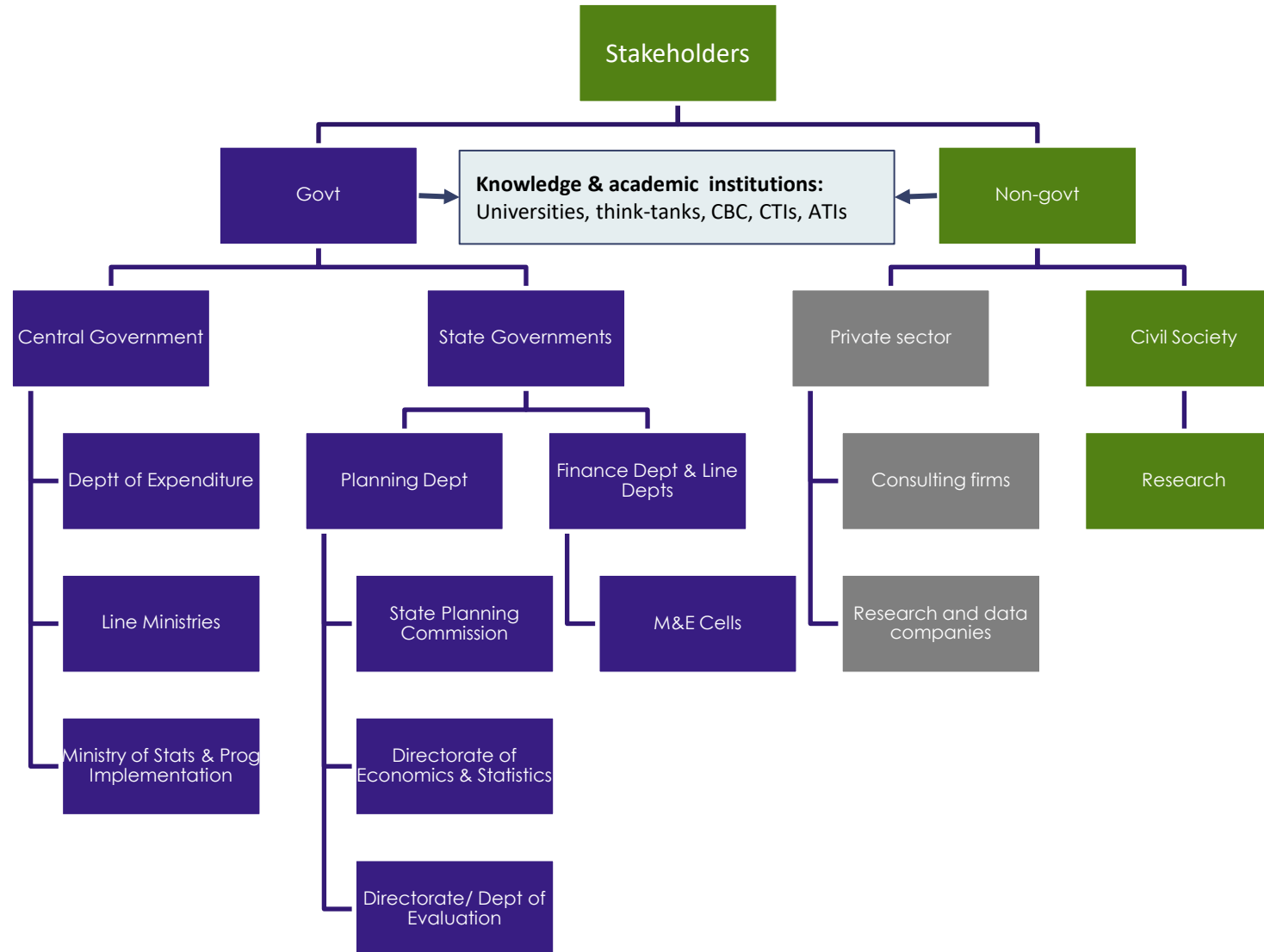
Vision: Improved sustainable outcomes and impacts of the government

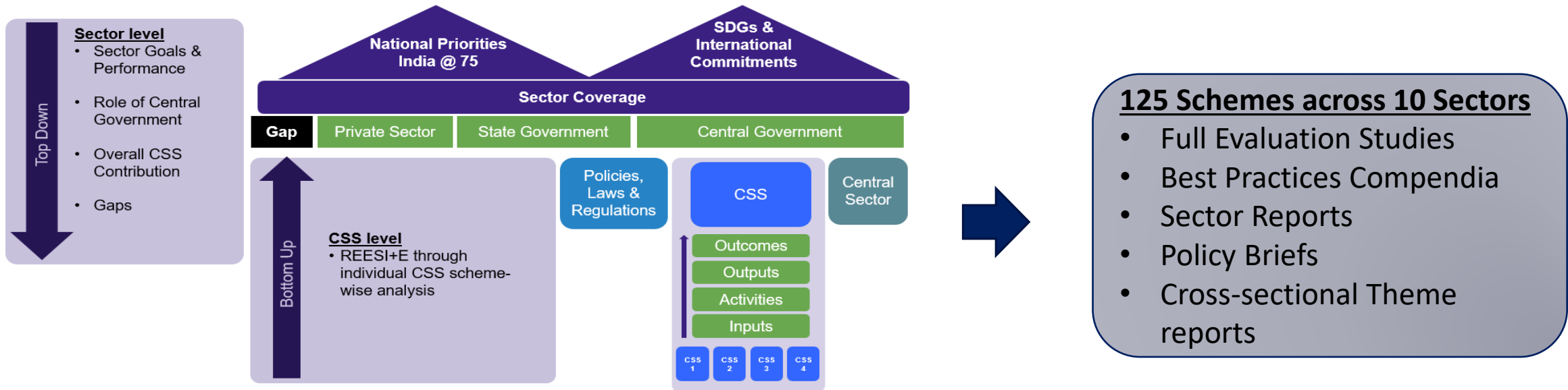

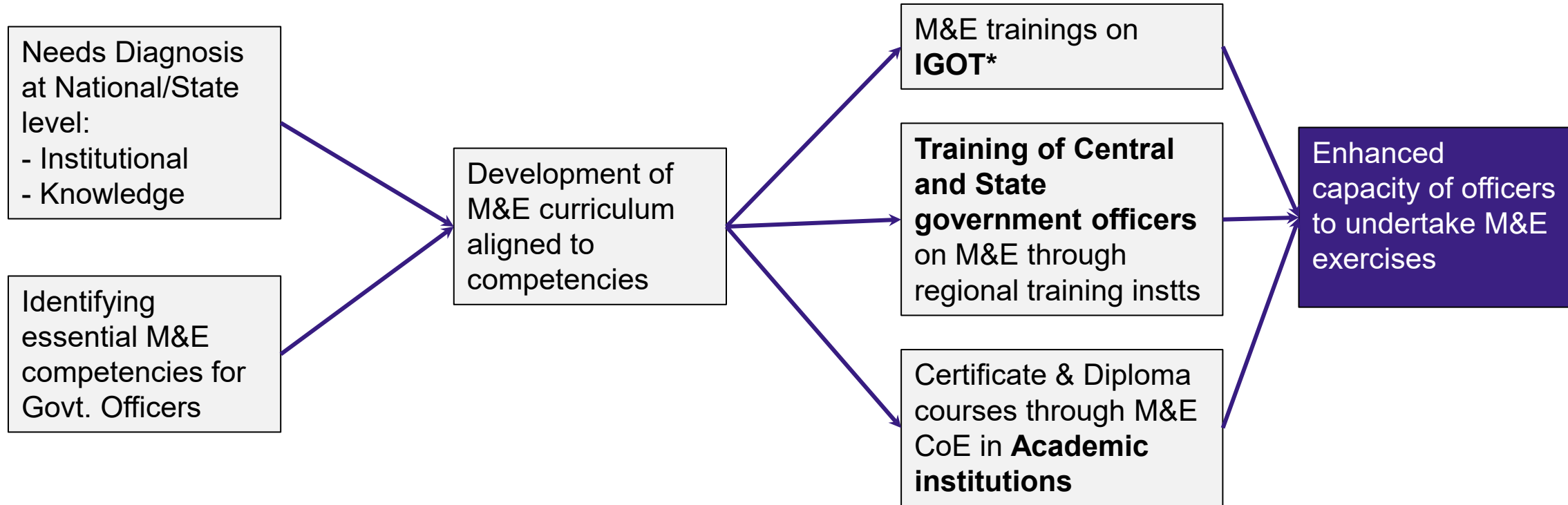

1 Rethinking Evaluations

- **SDG perspective** in the scope of evaluations
- **RCEESI + E Framework** (Relevance, Coherence, Effectiveness, Efficiency, Sustainability, Impact + Equity) - OECD
- Include **cross-sectional themes** such as gender mainstreaming, inclusion of marginalized populations
- **Multiple products** to address needs of policy makers – Quick Assessments, Performance Notes, Rigorous Evaluations, Policy Briefs etc.

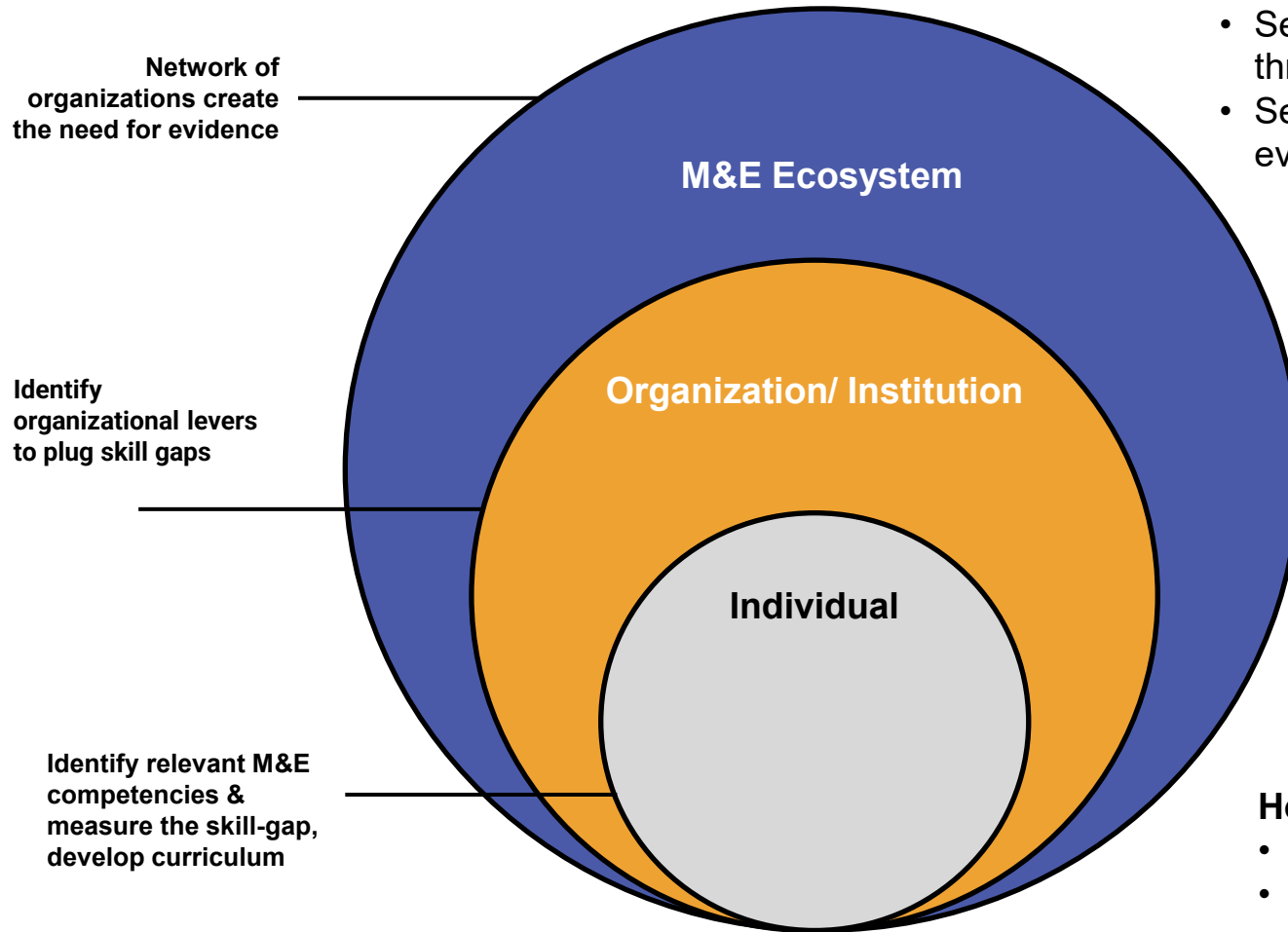

Capacity building – Multi-level Framework



Role of ecosystem

- Sets the overarching demand for evaluations and evidence through organizational networks
- Sets the standards and expectations from evaluators and evidence

Why institutions matter?

- Capacity building initiatives are situated within an institutional context
- Strong institutions are key to sustaining and utilizing learnings from capacity development
- Strengthening of institutions/processes has to happen alongside capacity building initiatives

How to build individual capacities?

- Systematic look at existing capacities
- Plugging gaps and identifying spaces for continual learning

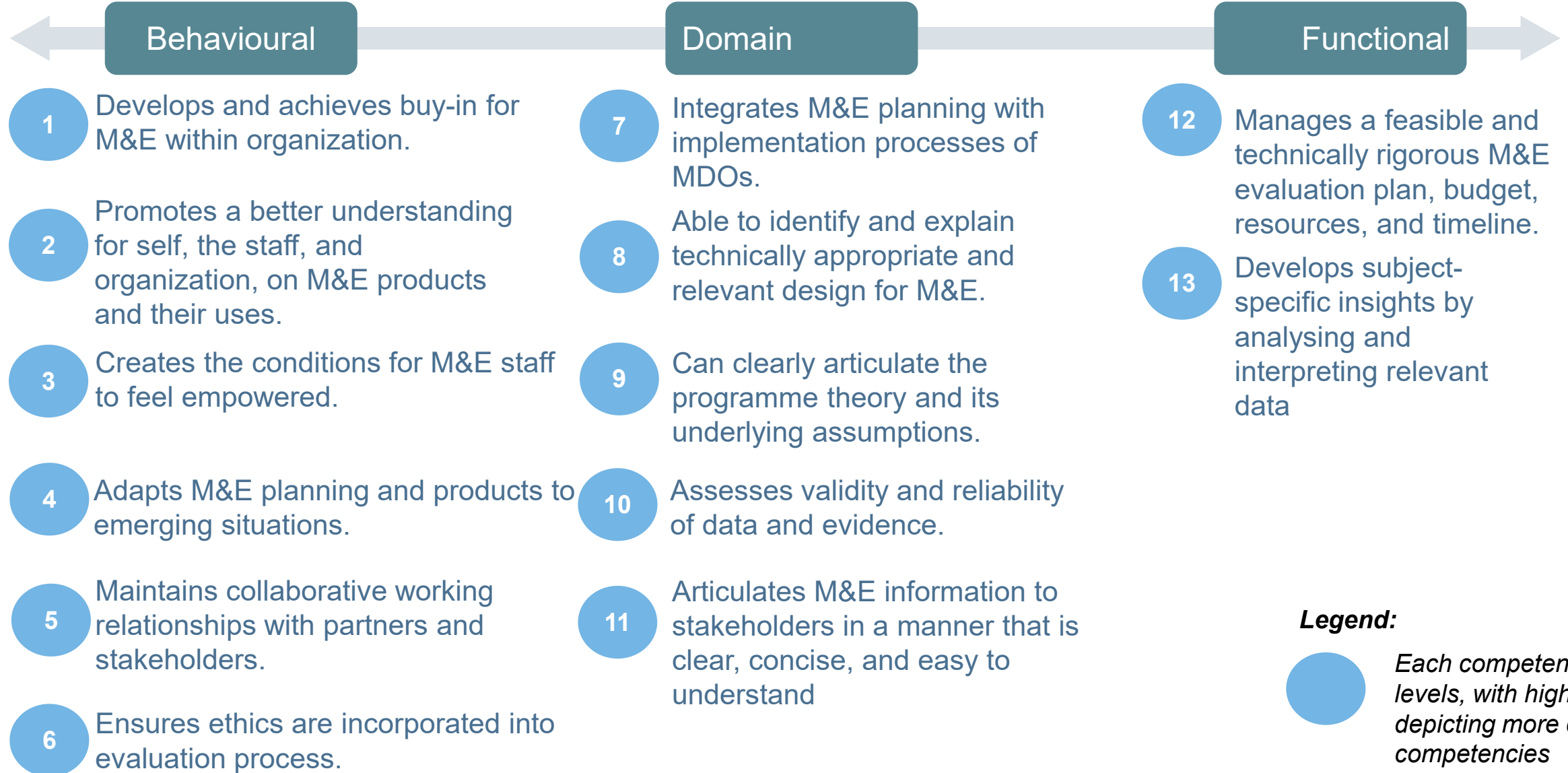
OBJECTIVES

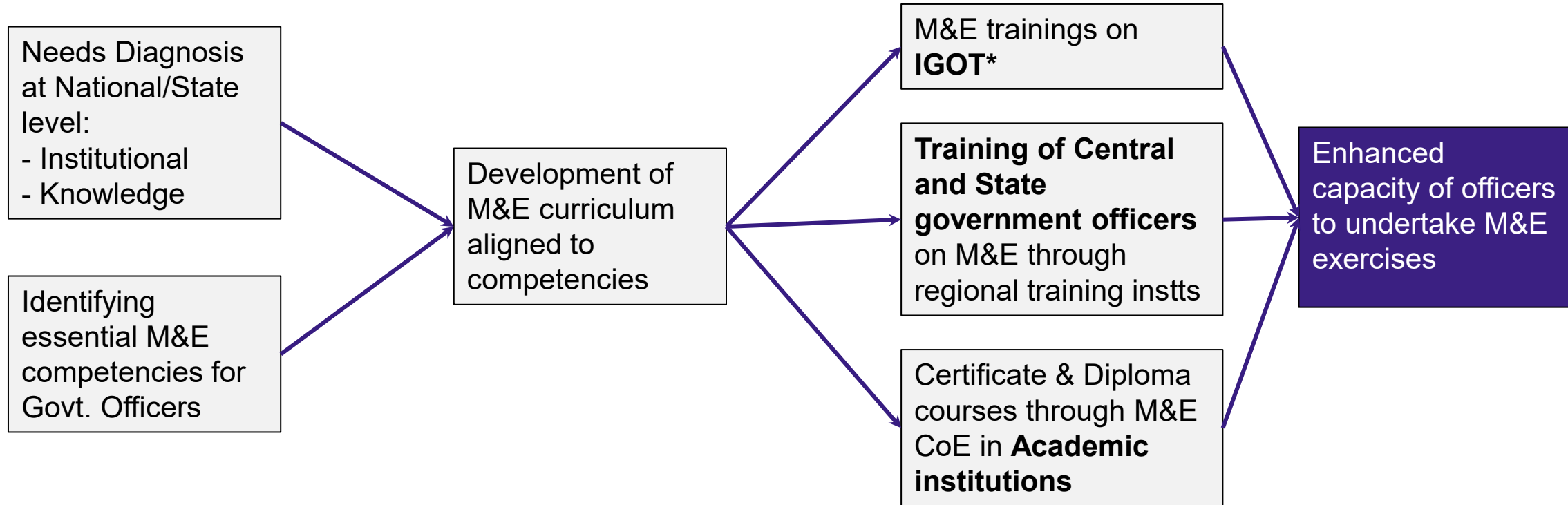

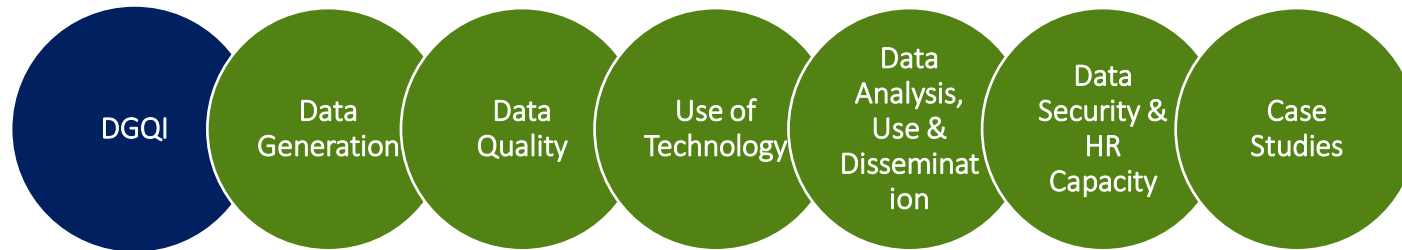

Scoring from 1 to 5 across **65 M/Ds**

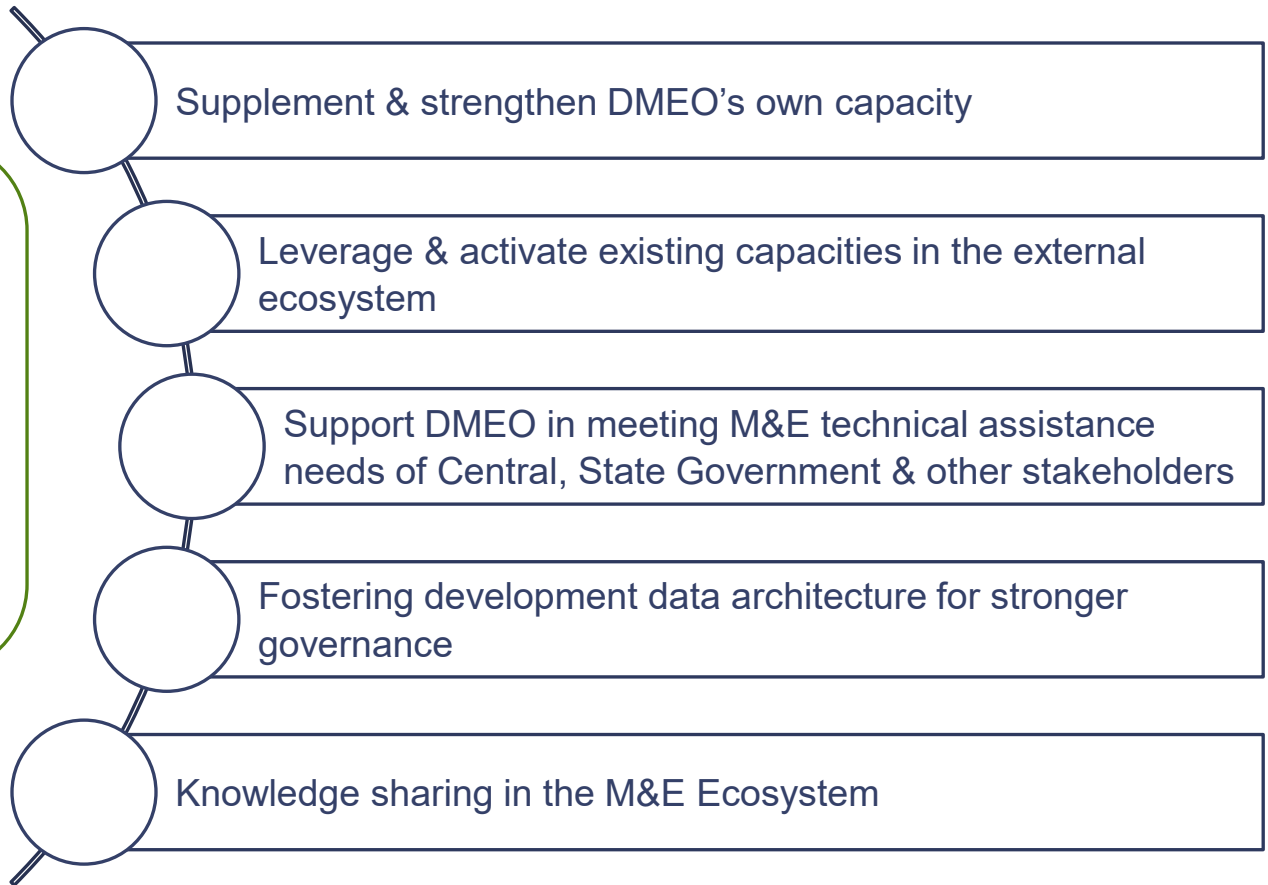
Data Strategy Units in each M/D to be set up

Example: Karnataka Model of Development



- One of the first States to formulate an **Evaluation policy in 2000**
 - Schemes over Rs.1 crore outlay evaluated at least once in Plan period.
 - 1% of the total outlay of a project/scheme to be kept for project evaluation purpose.
 - Outcomes to be used for Improving Programme Design and Delivery.
 - Justification to take a Programme forward beyond Plan period.
- **Karnataka Evaluation Authority** set up in 2011 with clearly defined institutional mechanism for planning, conducting evaluations and follow-up on recommendations
 - Conducted **150+ evaluations** since inception
