Japan's New Assistance for Africa

1. Food and Humanitarian Aid of a total of approximately 300 million US dollars

The Government of Japan will implement food and humanitarian aid amounting to a total of approximately 271,300 thousand US dollars (approximately 29,933,900 thousand yen) to African countries. For the most part, this aid is intended to provide food assistance, to expand social safety nets, and to enhance agricultural productivity.

Japan will also implement aid for measures against climate change (grant aid for environmental programs) of approximately 28 million dollars (3.2 billion yen) in total, to four African countries suffering the effects of climate change such as droughts.

2. Contribution of approximately 200 million US dollars to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria

On March 24, the Government of Japan will disburse approximately 194 million US dollars (approximately 22 billion yen) to the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, Tuberculosis and Malaria (the Global Fund). As a fund assisting the efforts to fight three major infectious diseases in developing countries, the Global Fund is playing a critical role in global health. This contribution by the Government of Japan is expected to strengthen the efforts of achieving the Millennium Development Goals in Africa and promote human security.

- 1. The Global Fund is an organization established in January 2002 in Geneva, following-up on G8 Kyushu-Okinawa Summit in 2000, to provide financial assistance to fight three major infectious diseases in developing countries. The organization has committed up to approximately 15 billion US dollars in 140 countries to support 740 grants to fight three diseases.
- 2. This is the first contribution which comprises Japan's pledge announced in May 2008 to provide approximately 560 million US dollars in coming years to the Global Fund. This contribution shows that Japan continues to strongly commit itself to international cooperation in global health, albeit the worsening state of the global economy.
